The troubles which have culminated in the resignation of Henry Villard as president of the Northern Pacific first cropped out on the 27th of the present month, when he resigned the presidency of the Oregon Transcontinental and Oregon Railway & Navigation companies.

The shares of these companies had been on the decline in the market for some time, and when Mr. Villard resigned there was many on hand with prophecies that he would retire from the presidency of the Northern Pacific before the beginning of the new year.

The Oregon Railway & Navigation company, of which Mr. Villard was president at the time, acquired control of the Northern Pacific in March, 1883. On the 10th of June following, the Billings, president of the Northern Pacific, resigned, and Mr. Villard was elected to succeed him.

Canned food is now occupying the attention of a number of English doctors, and the results of their investigations show that numerous casualties may be traced to this source. Careful analyses have revealed the presence of tin in solutions in canned fruits, vegetables, meats, soups, milk, in fact, in nearly every description of food preserved in this manner. The amount of the poison—for that is what it is—varies from one to more than fourteen grains to the pound. Although it would require but fourteen times fourteen grains of tin to cause immediate death, it would certainly not be conducive to physical well-being to have the system constantly impregnated, even by small doses. Moreover, numerous well attested cases of poisoning from eating canned foods prove that the danger is a real one. Of course, the chief source of the trouble lies in the quality of the tin used in making the cans, and householders should not fail to examine each can closely when opened. If the inner surface be found in any measure corroded the contents may be considered as unwholesome. Another and no less important rule is to remove all the contents of the can immediately upon opening, placing them in a glass or china dish if not needed at once, and discarding the remainder of the metal and consequent contamination of the food quickly following their exposure to the air.

In addition to the foregoing, the typographical union will publish a newspaper, beginning this week. It is to be circulated gratis.
