DOUBLE TALK

The Presidency Still Hinges On New York.

WITH THE CHANCES ABOUT EVEN!

Although New York is claimed by the Republicans by 900 Plurality.

Great Excitement Prevails

Later Developments Anxiously Looked For.

The election of Tuesday last has now been reduced to the question of who has carried New York state and the result hinges on the accurate footing of the long columns of figures.

The footings of the election districts made by the Associated Press indicate that Blaine has a margin about equal to that claimed by the Democrats and there are two prospects yet to hear from.

Several strong Republican papers among them the Albany Evening Journal concede the election of Grover Cleveland, and the latter paper says:

"There seems to be no longer a doubt that Grover Cleveland has been elected. Every county has sent in its full vote, after a careful verification of the returns, and the result is as follows: Grover Cleveland a plurality about a thousand in the state. The vote will not vary 200 on either side of these figures, New York gives Cleveland enough votes to elect him. The Journal has devoted its entire time to wards and counties, and the result is not very reluctantly stated that the election has been decided differently from the desire, because it believes that the prompt recognition of the will of the majority is essential to the maintenance and preservation of American institutions. So long as the people of the United States persist in transferring the federal administration to the Democratic party, we are glad that the decision has been made in favor of a Democrat from New York State."

The Pioneer Press of to-day in commenting upon the above paragraph says:

"The Republican newspapers like the Albany Journal and Chicago Tribune, that are in union with Blaine, are so anxious to get the result made a mistake as serious, though not as fatal, as the mistake made by the Democratic press. It is not clear that somebody shall be killed by this election question."

In spite of all these conflicting reports there is yet a chance of Blaine's election when the final count is made. It is not clear that Cleveland has been fairly elected as chief magistrate of the United States while on the other hand if Blaine carries the majority of the vote, he is ever so small, he should be the next President, and the idea advanced by newspapers and persons that either Blaine or Cleveland should be inaugurated in opposition to the will of the majority, should be hoisted at.

Further developments may materially change the aspect of things, "a consummation devoutly to be hoped for."

Northern Pacific Earnings.

Northern Pacific earnings for October were the largest month's earnings in the history of the road.

They fell short, however, of the estimate made by an official of the company and published in these columns a few days ago.

This was due to a slight falling off during the last week of the month. During that time bad weather had a great effect upon both west and stock shipments.

The earnings of the month averaged \$1,400,000 against \$1,337,222 earned during October 1883.

This is an increase of \$64,183. Practically the increase is much greater during the fall of 1884 the company transported for its own use a large quantity of construction material.

While this properly went into the earnings it was not money directly received into the company.

The largest single month's earnings previous to October was that of April last. These were \$1,441,544.68 or \$17,855.32 short of those of last month.

During the present season the company has delivered at Duluth 7,100 cars of 1,300,000 tons. The estimated number of bovers delivered at Minnesota Transfer for east bound shipment is 65,000 against 33,000 last season, an increase of 32,000.
