THE MINNESOTA TREE LAW. The question of the desirability of urging the passage of the new Minnesota tree law was discussed at the recent convention of American nurserymen at Chicago.

The law declares it unlawful for any person, corporation or association to sell, or offer for sale, any tree, shrub or plant, or to grow in the state of Minnesota, without first filing with the secretary of state an affidavit setting forth his name, age, occupation and residence; and if an agent, the name, occupation and residence of his principal; and to refuse to furnish a duplicate order, with the contract, specifying that such stock is true to name, and is represented. The penalty for disobeying is a fine of not more than twenty-five dollars, or imprisonment for not more than thirty days, or both, at the discretion of the court.

Anyone who sells or offers for sale foreign-grown nursery stock in the State shall furnish to the purchaser a duplicate order, with the contract, specifying that such stock is true to name, and is represented. The penalty for disobeying is a fine of not more than twenty-five dollars, or imprisonment for not more than thirty days, or both, at the discretion of the court.

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NEWS OUT IN A NEW PLACE.

Brainerd, Thursday. The Brainerd News of this morning contains an editorial article which says that an experienced journalist of this city had made the statement that the circulation of the News for one of its several issues was 450 copies. I think the editorial refers to me, as I made the remark in the Brainerd office a few days ago that I saw the last Sunday edition of the News after one of its had been printed, and that I thought it contained about 450 copies. I wish to say that that remark nowhere else, and that as the Journal and the Democrat are both printed on one press, and friendly relations exist between the two papers, some frequent expressions of opinion and statements of fact passed between the proprietors that we are not intended for the ears of other people. It was so in these cases. We invariably speak well of the News to the business men and others with whom we have conversed about it, both as to the merits as a newspaper and as to the character of its editor. It is not to be thought that we are in any way prejudiced against the News, but that we are in the attitude of looking after our own interests as a newspaper, and that we are not making a friendly call to injure that paper.

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RAILROAD TIMES IN ITS LAST ISSUE.

The railroad bond market, which has remained dormant for the past three weeks, was brought up in the city council on Tuesday evening, and has reached its final conclusion. It was understood that a proposition would be made from the Board and Northern, and the delay had been caused by waiting for it. It now appears that the M. & N. proposition will be forthcoming inasmuch as one of the officers of the company is expected to be called to a meeting to fill it. Such being the case, the Manitoba Company will then give its proposition and fall back to the city council, and the M. & N. proposition will be either returned to the city council or negotiated, claims for stockholders' shares, and the disposition of the city council, to be voted in at the election, or to be used to aid local enterprises, and encourage manufacturing, and the city council will be asked to accept of it. The proposition was received by Mayor Hartman from both President Hill and his assistant, W. P. Clough, to this effect, which were read to the council at a public meeting, and it was decided to call the election to be held on Friday, July 19. There is not the least doubt that the bonds will be sold at a big market, when the election is held, and we feel assured that the people perfectly safe in doing so.
