The people of Minnesota, outside of Minneapolis, emphatically protest against the appropriation of any more money to improve the Falls of St. Anthony for the benefit of Minneapolis millionaires.

The people of this city have just got a good right to ask that the government appropriate money to build our dam and improve the water power here. Minneapolis has already had \$1,000,000 expended by the government to improve her water power, and now we believe the rest of the state should get some benefit if there is any more money expended. Anyway why not let Minneapolis millionaires just as able to pay for improving their water power as are the people of St. Cloud, Little Falls or Brainerd!

An ordinance has been introduced in the common council of St. Paul granting the right to build and maintain a elevated railroad between St. Paul and Minneapolis to the Rapid Transit Co., the same to be built within two years. The fare for a trip between the two cities shall not exceed 25 cents, or fifteen cents if the distance is less than ten miles. It is expected that the railroad will reduce the fare between the cities to the above rates in the near future to discourage the enterprises.

The Minneapolis lumberman in his latest issue complains of the low price of water in the Mississippi, and says it is due to the fact that nearly all logging dams are shut down accompanying water. The lumbermen and other Minneapolis parties don't like in regard to this matter, is not the hindrance that it is, but because of the lack of power, but because of the lack of power at the falls, and, naturally enough, for a Minneapolisian, imagine the low price of water for the special benefit of Minneapolis, and that plenty of water for her mills should be furnished without regard for the interest of other parties. Unfortunately for the Flour City the lumbermen of this region don't think so, and they hold the water rights to this city, where plenty of power will be obtained the year round after the dam is completed, in a couple of months hence. Here we have not only as much power as Minneapolis but a great reservoir of water covering several thousand acres will be created during the low water in the river. It is a sign of progress, this insuring plenty of power at all times. It is more essential, it seems to us, that the lumbermen have to be made to log out, than that the Minneapolis mills should have power the year round, or be put to the expense of moving to some locality where they will have, and we believe this option will be held by nearly every body not directly interested in the Minnesota water power.

PROGRESS OF THE B. & N. W. Col. Campbell, who pretends to be a student of the law, is teaching to the Brainerd & Northwestern railroad, sends the following to the Pioneer Press.
