From the Duluth Herald we learn that an appeal to the supreme court will probably be made in the case of the recently decided by Judge Sleeper.

The Christmas edition of the Pioneer Press was a model of journalistic skill and enterprise. It contained 25 pages of interesting and instructive reading matter. The Globe also did itself proud on that day, it having even more pages than the Press. Both were handsome and were a credit to the enterprise in which they were published.

The inter-state commission has rendered a decision on the question as to whether express companies come under the provisions of the act. It has decided that where an express company is a part of a railroad it is covered by the act. But in the case of an independent organization the commission has thought best to refer the matter to congress.

Knute Nelson in an interview recently, said that he is about to give the mortgage he has on the Fifth district, and will retire from active political life. This will be good news to a score of middle dry politicians who have long been yearning to fill the Hon. Knute's shoes, but who have not had the slightest chance of getting the position as long as Knute was in it.

We are in receipt of the holiday number of The Sun, published at Sixth Street City, Neb. One of the principal writers on the journal is Wm. H. Keran, of Oklahoma State, who spent several days in Brainerd the past summer beating his board and drinking whiskey. Keran is an able writer and would make a fine newspaper man if he could master his appetite for alcoholic stimulants.

The trial of the Barrett Bros., in Minneapolis, for murdering the street car driver, Tolleson, is attracting wide spread attention. It is impossible to read the account of the case without a permit from the sheriff—and he is constantly beset by persons wanting a permit. The number was such a cold-blooded one, and the fact that one of the brothers had turned state's evidence and was trying to convict the other two, has raised great interest. W. W. Ervin, the great criminal lawyer, is defending them, but it looks at present as though they would be convicted.

Now that the Hon. Knute Nelson has retired from active political life, it would not be just and right to fill his position with some one of the central or eastern portion of the district? There is certainly a number of available candidates. Hon. G. B. Bowman, of Duluth, Hon. J. H. Rapley, of Duluth, would undoubtedly serve the district well in that capacity. Or, better still, why not Hon. S. G. Hartley, of Duluth, he is a suitable and desirable man for the position? Mr. Hartley is an energetic and capable young Republican, a hard worker, and in every way qualified to represent the interests of the Fifth district. It is to be hoped that the central and eastern portion of the district will unite in demanding that our next representative be chosen from this portion of the district. It is certainly nothing more than mere justice.

The Little Falls Transcript is agitating the question of extending the Manitoba road up the west bank of the Mississippi river to that place, claiming that it is necessary for Little Falls to have a competing road in order to get a manufacturing establishment to locate there. In this respect the Transcript is certainly right, no manufacturing establishment of any importance can they be attracted to locate there, in a town where there are no competing transportation lines. In this respect, however, Brainerd has the advantage of Little Falls, for there is not the slightest doubt but that the Manitoba will build, in the early spring, its line from Mill Lake to Crookston, by way of Brainerd, but we very much doubt if it will pay the Manitoba to construct over 80 miles of track in order to share the freight business of so small a town as Little Falls. Better commence your semi-annual hauls about the Northern Pacific, or Dr. Fuller.
