DISTRICT COURT.

March general term of the district court of Crow Wing county was opened on Monday morning last with Judge G. W. Holland on the bench. This is Judge Holland's first term of court since he took office a very favorable impression. The attention of the court on Monday was occupied by civil cases. The case of *Conway vs. Sheriff Haslock and J. B. Rhodes*, of Little Falls, a verdict of \$200 for the plaintiff being the result. Next came the case of *the State of Minnesota vs. Milo Lewanyan*, who was indicted for robbery in the first degree. This case was brought here on a change of venue from Wadena county and resulted in the conviction of the defendant as charged in the indictment. One Kingstone, an accomplice of Lewanyan, was then put on trial, his trial occupying all day Wednesday and Wednesday night to 11 o'clock and was not finished until about 10 yesterday morning, when the jury retired. The jury in this case were out all day Thursday until 11 o'clock in the evening, when the judge, seeing that they could not agree, discharged them, hence a new trial will be necessary.
