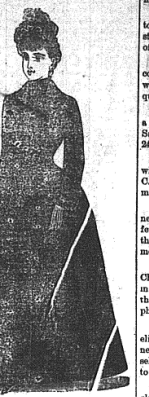

Col. C. L. Spaulding received word on Wednesday that his commission as postmaster at Duluth had been revoked from the department in Washington by mail, and will be probably revoked in a day or two, when he will at once take charge of the office. Col. Spaulding received his appointment one two months ago, and has been daily expiring his commission, but for some reason it did not come to the attention of the department. Spaulding one day last week had a telegram sent to Washington, asking the postmaster to be removed and report the cause of the delay. Upon investigation the attorneys found that the delay in sending the commission was due to the fact that a citizen of this city, whose name the attorneys give as Smith, had telegraphed the department to hold the commission until he charged a serious character, which it intended to prefer, had been filed.
