Want the Finances Showed Up. A correspondent of the Motley Register from Cass county who is evidently after the commoneer publishes the following under the head of "Enquirer" in the last issue of that paper.

I have a few questions to ask in regard to matters over here in Cass county. Of course we will admit for argument's sake, at least that our present members of the county board are for retrenchment and reform, at least so I am told on good authority.

In the year 1888 the full tax levied in Cass county was about \$100,000, and the county in much smaller sums. Where does that extra \$2,000 go to? I find that the state and county tax is a great deal more than former years. No extra levy is necessary for the new schools, for there are 1,200 belonging to the fund in the Crow Wing county. Why do the county fathers get it out and show it up?

In other counties of the state a financial statement is published annually, showing the county's standing, and how the business transacted during the year. Why in this out do in this county? And lastly?

Minneapolis is frightened. The Minneapolis lumbermen are very much disturbed over the recent developments in the Weyerhaeuser syndicate.

The fact that when the arrangements are completed and operations are commenced at this point it will give over place Minneapolis in the shade as a lumbering center is enough to put the people of that city on their feet.

This extract, from the local organs of that paper, shows how badly they dislike to admit the facts. The lumbermen have all the time referred to these possibilities as a fact instead of all day long as a rumor.

Following is another article intended to show why it would be the height of folly for any one to build mills at Brainerd, but a careful perusal of the article dispels the terrible hallucination. The article is as follows:

The Gull River lumber company, at Gull River and Curtis & Lawrence, whose mill is at Motley, Minn., are not to operate their mills during the coming season. This conclusion has been reached in view of the fact that the lumber trade in North Dakota, upon which those manufacturers depend, is so limited during the coming season. The operators of those mills are probably wise in their conclusion.
