## A BATCH OF CRIMINALS.

Eight Men Convicted in the District Court, a Majority Getting Penitentiary Sentences.

The district court which has been in session since the 10th of March, ended yesterday afternoon after trying a vast amount of business. The grand jury, and were as follows: James McClosky, convicted of larceny, and sentenced to two years at Stillwater in the state prison at Stillwater.

The evidence in the case showed that McClosky robbed a man by the name of John Trainer at Duha's hotel some time during the winter, the sum of money taken being \$25. Trainer went to bed drunk and the prisoner gained access to his room and took the money from his pocket, and when arrested, the same amount was found on his person.

Andrew Shook was convicted of larceny in the second degree and sentenced to serve nine months at hard labor in the penitentiary at Stillwater.

Mr. Shook was running a saw mill in Cass county and cut lumber from railroad lands, manufacturing the logs into lumber and selling the same. The amount of the larceny was something over \$500, and the indictment was returned on the 10th of March. Mr. Shook is considering the case reduced to the second degree, and accordingly the prisoner to the mercy of the court.

A new trial by his attorney.

Henry McLaw was convicted of larceny in the second degree and sentenced to serve three years at hard labor in the penitentiary at Stillwater.

Phillip Howard pleads guilty to robbery in the first degree and was sentenced to hard labor for two years at the Stillwater penitentiary.

Robert McNaughton pleads guilty to robbery in the third degree and was sentenced to the reformatory for one year.

The three men named above were connected in the robbery of a Swedish man named Nels O. Wigg in February. Wigg had come to the city from the woods and had about \$21. He fell in with Howard who concealed a scheme to rob the money, with the assistance of McLaw and McNaughton. Howard hired him to go into the woods in order to get into his condition, and on the last day of the month, after getting a few drinks of beer, they started to go to the train, as Wigg supposed, but had hardly left the house when they jumped onto his back and held him while young McNaughton went through his pockets, according to the charge, and extracted his money, \$20.50. In the case of McLaw, the jury recommended him to the mercy of the court. McLaw and Howard are probably two as tough crooks as have infested the town in some time, the former having been mixed up in a case of the same kind while the latter has "ostensibly been gaining a livelihood by playing piano in saloons and such like. Robert McNaughton, an innocent of his age, was sent to the reformatory where it is hoped the influences will be for his good.

John Willet, a colored man, pleads guilty to attempted rape, and was sentenced to three years in the Stillwater penitentiary.

Willet's attempted crime was committed on a two-year-old daughter of Peter Oet in December last, in East Duluth, the little girl being on an errand at the time the brute met her, and but for the timely arrival of help would have had her.

Patrick Murphy pleads guilty of larceny and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$10, or fifteen days imprisonment to the county jail.

Murphy's crime was that of receiving through the mail a trunk which he sold to another party. He took the trunk to the baggage room and left the trunk and sold it. As he had laid in jail since last September and pleads guilty his sentence was made as light as possible.

Joseph Tuff was convicted of the crime of drunkenness under the Scheffer law and sentenced to pay a fine of \$10, or 15 days in jail, the case being an appeal from the municipal court.

Among the other cases tried was that of Lucius A. Curtis vs. Della Curtis, which was an action for divorce on the ground of adultery. The jury gave a verdict for the husband. The case has been one of considerable notoriety, especially in the southern portion of the county, and both parties were prominent members of the Ad. vest church.

The case against Henry T. Moore for arson and who was indicted, was continued at request of defendant on account of the absence of certain witnesses. Mr. Moore was released on bail, the amount being \$1,000.

A grand musical convention will be organized on Tuesday evening, April 7th, by Prof. R. B. George, with a free concert in the M. E. church. Prof. George, pupil of Wm. Shaker Speer, London, a student of Boston, Paris, Rome and Berlin conservatories has been engaged to instruct the class. He is recommended by competent authorities to be equal to any instructor in America. The cost of instruction in class is less than 7 cents for an hour's lesson. The same instruction in private lessons would cost \$2 for each half hour. Books will be loaned members of class with privilege of buying at reduced rates. Class will be organized Tuesday evening, April 7th, at 7:30 o'clock, at the M. E. church, tuition for fifteen lessons, \$1. The convention will close with a grand concert. All interested in music are respectfully urged to unite with the class.


