Drawing Party Lines.

In another column we publish a call for a republican city convention to place in nomination candidates for the various city offices. This is a move of which the Democrat heartily approves and has accepted all about for what seems to us good and sufficient reasons. In the first place it will give us a good strong republican organization, and train the republicans of the city and county to work more in unity in state and national campaigns. As it now is there is no local republican organization at all, and every state election necessitates the reorganizing of a local organization, which is then done only in a half-hearted manner, which results in the loss of a great many votes to the party who would otherwise be strong active party men. It is maintained by some that the attempt to form an organization and draw party lines at this time, is in the interest of certain candidates or candidates. This we know not. We know only that favoring a move of this kind is to strengthen the party, which we believe it will do, even if the candidates are defeated, for we will still have a good organization formed for work in the future. But we do not fear defeat if a desire to nominate our best man actuates the convention as we believe it should and will. Then if republicans in the city will unite and support the ticket, defeat is impossible. As it now is the most of our offices are occupied by democrats, and a democrat is elected by the grace of republican votes, a report is sent broadcast over the state that Brainerd has gone democratic, just as if the fight had been on party lines, when in fact it is not, nor ever has been a democratic city. Republicans are in the majority and should govern the city and be held responsible. Therefore let us draw party lines and get the credit if we win, or be fairly defeated to the odium of defeat if we lose. The cry that this movement is in the interest of certain candidates is attempted, so this would not stop the movement, or the city from continuing the good work until Brainerd is safely in the republican fold where she rightly belongs.

An important legal decision is given by the general passenger agent of the Southern Pacific Railroad, in respect to the railway and police at large.

San Francisco, March 12, 1891. On May 15, 1890, two unlimited first-class tickets of the issue of the Union Pacific Railway company for San Diego, Cal., were presented by H. E. Drummond and wife for their passage over this company's road from Ogden, Utah, to Los Angeles, California.

The tickets were sold at Blue Rapids, Kan., on April 15, 1890, to one E. K. Campbell. The selling agent had allowed the tickets to have his hands without the passenger's signature to the contract or that of himself as witness.

The purchaser (Campbell) used the tickets for passage to Ogden and then disposed of them to a ticket broker, when they were sold to Mr. Drummond.

Under our rules and because the tickets had been sold without the passenger's signature to the contract or that of himself as witness, the conductor declined to accept them, and they were required to leave the train at Blue Rapids, Kan., and purchase local tickets. As a result, Mr. Drummond and wife were required to pay \$100.00 damages. On the trial, the court found in favor of the plaintiff, and the verdict was \$100.00.
