THE FIRST VICTORY

The Republicans Elect M. Hagberg Mayor of Brainerd.

A Republican Council Also Elected.

A. J. Demerits Elected Treasurer and T. M. Kelly, Assessor, Both Democrats.

The municipal election in this city occurred on Tuesday and the result was a decided victory for the party movement which was started by the republican organization, M. Hagberg being elected mayor by a majority of 314.

The most sanguine of the party leaders did not expect to make a clean sweep in the first effort, but to lay the foundation for future city and county elections. The election of T. M. Kelly to the assessor's office was brought about by a combination of circumstances which could not be prevented.

Mr. Demerits was returned to an account of his personal popularity, and from the fact that Mr. Low was only announced as a candidate on Friday. Mrs. Hagberg's election, having taken L. P. Johnson's place on the ticket. Of the city council, seven out of ten are pronounced republicans. The victory on the polls on Tuesday is one which every citizen in the city, and the county for that matter, can appreciate.

The democrats scoffed at the idea of party lines when the movement was talked of, and endeavored to pick the strongest party leader they had and endeavored to elect him. How they succeeded can be appreciated by glancing at the figures in the table below—the republican candidate receiving two votes to one.

The journal undertakes to state itself by saying that the vote did not run on party lines and that Dr. Hemstead's vote was mostly a complimentary one.

A MAJORITY OF 314 in a city election is quite satisfactory as a starter.

There is one satisfaction in the election of Mr. Hagberg, as Brainerd will have a mayor who has been elected strong enough to carry out his own ideas.

The new council will convene for the first time on Tuesday evening at which time they will organize. As to who will be elected president of the body there is considerable speculation.

The Western Tribune says that the construction on the Walden & Park Rapids railroad, which is building from that place, complains that they are unable to obtain men in Brainerd with which to complete their contracts.

How He Was Found. The Presto Change says: Word was brought to this city Thursday that the body of a man had been found by two drivers on the east bank of the Long Prairie, about a half a mile above the mill race at Parkhurst, and as there seemed a probability that it was Arthur Bell, Freeman who had been missing since early in the winter, a committee was sent down to investigate. The body was gone from the fact, but it was identified as the body of Bell by his clothes and the right hand work. The body lay a short distance from the river and in the right hand corner of a hole in the ground.

The new council is composed of a representative body of men who will give Brainerd a good, clean administration. Considerable young blood is infused into the veins of the municipal government, which is a thing to be regretted. The council as it is now composed is as follows:

First ward—P. M. Lagerquist and N. K. Barber. Second ward—A. F. Ferris and James McArthur. Third ward—W. W. Williamson and Herman Miller. Fourth ward—P. G. Fogelstrom and James Towler. Fifth ward—L. P. Johnson and J. H. Jan.

The gentlemen who compose the body are all well known to the citizens, most of them having been before for the people in official capacities. It is felt that a conservative body of men the Dispatch predicts that their official acts will bear the closest scrutiny.

The City to Support Them.

The members of Co. K, of this city, are feeling somewhat jubilant over the fact that the recent legislature passed a bill which would give them the honor in which military companies are located to support them. The law provides that whenever it shall appear by the certificate of the commander of the regiment or battalion to which any company, organized under the provisions of the General Laws of the State of Minnesota (the military code), and the amendments thereof, belongs, that such battery or company has reached the minimum number of enlisted men who regularly attend the drills on Tuesday evening in each company, the commanding officer of the regiment or battalion, the mayor and the treasurer of the city, town or village, or where there is no mayor, then the proper authorities of the town or village in which such battery or company is located, shall constitute a board to erect or rent, within the bounds of such city, town or village, for the use of such battery or company, a suitable or convenient armory, drill room and place of deposit for the safe keeping of the arms, uniforms, accoutrements and camp and other equipments furnished under the provisions of this act. And whenever, in the opinion of the officers in permanent command or permanent charge of any armory, the same shall be found for the use for which it is designed, to be so well adapted to the use thereof to said board, which board shall forthwith examine into the condition of such armory and shall have power thereupon to direct the alteration, repair, enlargement or abandonment of the same, and in case of abandonment, to provide another suitable armory. The expense of altering, repairing, enlarging or enlarging, or purchasing lands for the erection of armories, and for providing the necessary camp stoves, apparatus and fixtures for heating and lighting and the fuel and gas or oil for the same, and water closets in such building, and for the proper preserving from injury the armaments, uniforms and records stored therein by the construction of suitable lockers, closets, gun racks and cases for uniforms, equipments, arms and records and for the maintenance thereof in good and safe repair, shall be a portion of the charges of such city, town or village, and shall be levied, collected and paid in the same manner as other city, town or village charges for the same, and in case of failure to obey, an engineer, the commander for such person not to exceed \$25 per day for actual time, and that he shall be paid monthly and be a charge upon the city, town or village in which arms and ammunitions is situated.

The cost of maintaining Co. K will probably not exceed \$300 a year, and so on as things can be adjusted the city will be asked to either build or rent them a suitable place.

The roller mill has been used by them and with some internal improvements can be so made suitable for their use as to be satisfactory to the officers. Should the company desire to have new quarters, and thereby be obliged to build a house, the expense estimated will be quite heavy.
