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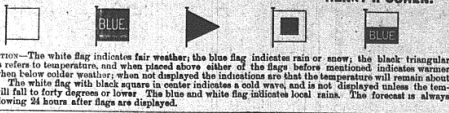
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In order to give the public instructions as to the meaning of the flags displayed by the weather bureau on the City Hall, we append these cuts with explanations.



EXPLANATION—The white flag indicates fair weather; the blue flag indicates rain or snow; the black triangular flag always refers to low centers, and when placed above either of the flags before mentioned indicates warm weather; when below either of the flags, when not displayed the indications are that the temperature will remain about stationary. The white flag with black squares in center indicates a cold wave, and is not displayed unless the temperature will fall to forty degrees or lower. The blue and white flag indicates local rain. The blue and white flag for the following 24 hours after flags are displayed.

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A Lengthy Meeting.

The city council held a meeting on Monday evening which was unusually interesting to those present, and the members were all present except Albin Bain who came in later. The Weather Signal.

City Clerk Ferrar now regulates the weather in this city, in other words he has charge of the weather flags which are hoisted each morning from the hose house. The flags are five in number and in their position on the pole should be downward. The blue flag indicates fair weather; the blue flag with black squares in center indicates a cold wave, and is not displayed unless it is expected that the temperature will fall to forty-two degrees or lower.
