The City Council.

The council met in regular session last Monday evening. All present.

A report of the electric light committee regarding the examination of the water wheel at the station was read, accepted and left in the hands of the committee with power to act.

A report of the police committee on bill of J. McDonough was accepted and a motion was carried that the bill be referred back to Mr. McDonough and notice given him that as he was appointed special police officer without pay the council would give him what he should expect pay.

Bills were allowed as follows: Brainerd Public square, \$800. E. P. Walters, fire hose house, \$600. Mrs. J. C. City Engineer, \$100. Peter Peterson, assisting engineer, \$100. The finance committee reported that the city would need about \$50,000 Jan. 1, 1903, to meet obligations of the city falling due at that time.

A motion was carried that the city clerk be instructed to prepare a bill for \$4,500 payable July 1, 1903, to the city treasurer for the payment of water rents on account of the fallow and reforestation of the city streets and the East Brainerd bridge, and the water wheel at the station.

The street committee reported that the East Brainerd bridge, and the water wheel at the station had been covered.
