The State Agricultural Society has decided to hold no Fair this year. As a result the Board of Directors of the Minnesota Exposition have consented to combine some of the best features of the fair with their Exposition, and have appropriated a very liberal amount of money to be paid as premiums for the Exhibits of the products of Minnesota farms, gardens and dairies. A special feature will be the large premiums given to the Club making the largest and best display or collection of culinary or stock vegetables or other products grown or produced by residents of any one county also the most unique, artistic and to the individual making either five or single exhibits. These several departments will be under the auspices of committees selected from the State Horticultural Society, State Dairy Association, and State Beekeepers Association, who will also assist in preparing the premium list which will be issued about May 1st. The Exposition will furnish agents and commodious space and all the necessary facilities for making these exhibits.

Notes from Legislative Hall.

The legislative bodies have come to the conclusion that hard work will have to be done in order to finish the business of the session in time allotted, the fact being that if no time is wasted between now and the 18th of April, the last day the lawmakers can draw their salary for, there will be many measures that will go down for lack of time. There has been 445 bills introduced in the senate against 700 in the house up to the present time.

The house has passed a resolution bringing April 18th as the last day of the session, but it is not thought the senate will concur in it, and that the present session will run the full length of time.

The free text book bill was a special order on Tuesday and was recommended to pass after a very lively and interesting debate.

The special committee of the house of which R. G. Dunn, is chairman, and W. A. Fleming a member, appointed to investigate the recent sale of grain in Minn. Lake county at \$2.00 per bushel and at private sale by the state under, when there were many ready buyers, is making things exceedingly interesting for that official, and will probe the matter to the bottom. There will be some interesting matters brought to light before the matter is settled.

The new state capital bill which was to have been a special order for Wednesday, was postponed for one week through the persistent efforts of Representative Fleming, who did not desire to vote on the matter until he had fully investigated the matter and consulted his constituents. The bill provides for an appropriation of \$1,000,000 and the appointment of a commission to select a site within three-quarters of a mile of the present one for the new state building.

The bill for the taxation of railroad lands has again been postponed by the senate and will come up on Tuesday next at which time it will be disposed of. The indications are that the senate will not pass it, although there may be a change in the sentiment before the final vote is taken.

The proposed Chicago trip by the legislature appears to be having a hard time of it, and it will not be taken until after the session, if at all. Gov. Nelson has flatly refused to go and the house will be governed by his action.

Council Meeting.

The council met in regular session last Monday evening, all the aldermen being present except Alderman Anderson of the Fourth ward.

Report of the clerk of the municipal court, chief of police, and Superintendent of electric lights were read and approved.

Report of building inspector in regard to frame building erected on lot 7 block 47 was referred to fire committee.

On motion the resignation of M. N. Gower as first engineer of the electric light plant was read and accepted.

On motion the city pay roll and electric light pay roll were allowed.

Electric light committee reported on bill of L. J. Call for \$100, that he be allowed \$50 per annum from Dec. 1st, 1882 to March 1st, 1883, and on adopted and a warrant was ordered to run for \$120.

Bill of J. J. Howe for \$180 was referred to purchasing committee.

Bill of members of fire department for work done at the Gray & Wheatley fire was referred to fire committee, and bill of M. Hagberg for \$10.00 was referred to purchasing committee.

Bill of C. Cross for \$20.00 was referred back to Mr. Cross.

On motion a warrant for \$100.00 was ordered drawn in favor of Andrew & Wood in part payment for their bill of oak lumber.

Motion made and carried that the matter of assessment of sidewalk tax of W. H. Thompson be referred to the joint committee.

On motion the city attorney was allowed an assistant in framing the index of the city charter after the March term of court, if he deemed one necessary.

Motion made and carried that the form of lease presented by the electric light committee be adopted, and the city clerk and city engineer be authorized to execute it as the part of the city.

On motion the mayor was again requested to reduce his police force by one man.

On motion the commissions received from electric light companies concerning the relinquishing of the plant, were referred to the joint committee for further investigation.

Resignation of J. L. Camp, as Health officer, was withdrawn.

Ordinance No. 105, relating to cutting of tree below sewers in the city limits for sale in the city, had its first and second readings, and was passed without a dissenting vote.

On motion the clerk was instructed to notify R. L. Wise, J. P. Saunders, A. Z. Rowland and Chas. Baker that ordinance No. 105, amending ordinance No. 86, relating to coal weights and weights, received its first and second readings and was passed without a dissenting vote.

Application of J. Kulehan to build a one story brick veneered building on lot 7, block 47 was granted.

Applications and bonds of M. Callin & Co. Arthur Hoinland and John A. Deuss, for liquor licenses were granted.

Contract and bond of Halstead & Pennell, city printers, were read and approved.

Bonds of Werner Hemstead and Jas. McMurtry, as sinking fund commissioners were approved.

The matter of pulling up the oak lumber was referred to street committee.

The matter of cleaning up the alleys was left in the hands of the health committee in conjunction with the board of health.

Council adjourned.
