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Council Proceedings.

The council met in regular session on Monday evening, President Williamson and Alderman Parker being absent. After the reading of the minutes and other routine business, the city attorney reported that the case of the city against Albert Trudgion, Salvation Army captain, had been dismissed, and stated that the 100 attorneys for Trudgion desired the consent of the council to begin the case anew. On motion the council resolved to deny the request.

A communication from the mayor announced the appointment of J. M. Conroy and R. F. Thompson as patrolmen on the police force. On motion the appointments were confirmed.

The health committee reported that the bill of C. Ross of \$5 be not accepted, and the report was on motion approved.

Moved and carried that the matter of the removal of the obstruction in front of Peter Lewal residence be referred to street committee.

Police committee reported favorably on the petition of W. R. Chambers for a license to conduct a street theatre company, and on motion the report was adopted.

Mr. Smith recommended that the matter of securing a new dumping ground be referred to health committee and board of health with power to act.

On motion the following committee was appointed to secure a new hay market, the committee to report at the next meeting: Alderman Paine, Johnson and Sandborn.

The mayor returned ordinance No. 107 to the city clerk, for the reason that it had not been passed by the council. On motion the ordinance received its second reading and was then passed by a majority of 30 yeas, and 3 nays.

The purchasing committee was instructed to procure uniforms for dry.

Board of W. J. Jones as street commissioner on O'Brien and E. Lyons was accepted.

Moved and seconded that J. McNaughton be paid \$60 for his services as an inspector of health.

Mr. McNaughton then addressed the council at length on the unsanitary condition of the city.

Moved and carried that the board of health be requested to hold a hearing and organize, and adopt rules relating to the same.

On motion the matter of street paving was referred to street committee. Council adjourned.
