## A Worthy Society.

On Tuesday an address was held at the residence of Mrs. E. M. Westfall to complete the organization of a branch of the Society of Friends of America, of which it is now known as the Society in our own city.

On Friday last work continued in the search of the shoshon which Mr. Voerge and his men had been making for some time. The party arrived at the place about noon and were directed to spot by Mr. Voerge. The body, or bone rather, lay about 200 feet from the railroad track on the right side, and in a little hollow which had been made by the up-roofing of a tall pine tree. The entire skeleton was there with the exception of the lower limbs and hands which had probably been carried off by wolves which are numerous in the section. The skull was examined and on the left side over the eye was found a fracture which had evidently been made by some instrument and it could have been a terrific blow for the skull was cracked in all directions from the center of the skull and a little to the right was a second fracture, probably where the first blow was struck for it was not nearly so narrow as the other. The skull being that the man had on at the time he met his death was a black coat and vest and brown pants and blue striped shirt. In the pockets the only things discovered were a wooden pipe and a small round wooden box, evidently a snuff box. There were no other things by which the man's identity could be discovered unless it was by his tools, which were perfect. The man still retained his baby eye and a fact discovered by Dr. Ribble after the bones had been brought into the city, was that the man was under a number jaw had not yet made their appearance. These things would indicate that he was quite a young man.

There is no doubt that the man was murdered, but how and under what circumstances will probably never be known.

Coroner Dean has the bones and clothing at the morgue of Loney & Dean and will keep them for some time before he buries them, in case anything should turn up.

Not in the Usual Way. Thomas Murphy's family of southeast Brainerd, was increased one on Monday evening, and the peculiar case of conceiving was due to the fact that the baby was left in his kitchen by an unknown party. Mrs. Murphy and a neighbor were in the front part of the house at the time when they heard an infant crying and proceeding to the kitchen they found a nine month old baby girl about a month old wrapped up in a neat cloth in the floor just inside the screen door where she had evidently been placed at a moment before. Who ever had placed the foundling there had made good their escape without detection, for no one was in sight nor had been seen at the time.

The baby was taken up and a note removed by the ladies and a note was found attached to the baby which was signed with a five dollar bill and amount to procure for publication, stated that the child's name was Anna Marie and that she was the daughter of a party who placed her there to have her christened in the Catholic faith, and asked Mr. Murphy's help to raise her.
