On Monday evening between five and six o'clock the jewelry store of A. E. Yoon, on the Grand, at the corner of Fifth street was broken into and robbed between thirty and forty minutes. Three men by the name of James (lower), John Carroll and John Gallagher have been arrested for the offense and are now in jail to await the action of the grand jury.
