NEWS OF THE STRIKE

THE GREATEST RAILROAD STRIKE IN THE HISTORY OF THE COUNTRY IS NOW IN FULL FORCE.

All the Leading Roads Centering in Chicago are Tied Up and not a Wheel Moving.

THE NORTHERN PACIFIC FIRST AFFECTED.

Latest Telegraphic Reports.

Special Telegrams in Discharge.

MINNEAPOLIS, June 29.—Disruptive news from Chicago says two railway systems, Santa Fe and Northern Pacific, stand still. The Illinois Central is a news of the strike of the Ohio River, and local troubles exist on the Baltimore and Ohio, Chicago and North-western, and Missouri lines. This was announced early this morning.

At headquarters of A. R. U. it was stated that general strikes had been ordered on Milwaukee, the reason for this being that officials of the road agreed not to put non-union men at work in place of union men who had been laid off.

About 100 men engaged in Baltimore on Philadelphia take the Chicago and St. Louis line. This was announced early this morning.

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At St. Paul, Minn., the Pullman board of directors met this morning. The board decided to refuse to handle Pullman cars, and the company on whose lines Pullman cars were used to be charged the men who so refused to do this.
