### The New Engine.

The newly elected officers of the city assumed the reins of government on Tuesday, Mayor Hahnstedt qualifying first that morning.

The newly elected members of the council met that evening and City Clerk Hahnstedt administered the oath of office.

H. Poppenberg of the third ward was elected temporary chairman, and the council proceeded at once to elect a permanent organization. Nominations for president of the council were called for. H. Poppenberg's name was placed in nomination, and on motion he was elected by acclamation, and Alderman Purdy was elected vice-president by acclamation.

On motion an informal ballot was taken for city clerk which resulted in Charles Bak & J. J. Howe Jr., S. F. A. Farrar.

A formal ballot was ordered which resulted as follows: Dank S. Howe 2, Farrar 5.

There being no choice, a second ballot was ordered, which resulted in Dank S. Howe 1, Farrar 6. Mr. Farrar having received a majority he was declared elected.

On motion W. S. McClellan was re-elected city treasurer.

Council then proceeded to ballot for city engineer which resulted in favor of Lyman Arma No. 2 for R. K. Whiteley. Mr. Arma was declared elected.

The council now having fully organized, the mayor's message was read by the city clerk as follows: To the Honorable President and Members of the City Council: GENTLEMEN: I have the honor to inform you from the election generally observed by my predecessors in the mayor's office, that it will not be my duty to lengthen the various economical questions now pending in the city. I take it for granted that you all deeply feel the importance of the matter now before you, and I am sure that you will all be glad to see the city prosper and to see the people, whose interests are an honest, clean and economical administration.
