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FATAL BOILER EXPLOSION. A Former Brainerd Resident Instantly Killed As Result. Edwin R. Smith, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Smith, for many years resident of the city, and well known to our people, was instantly killed by the explosion of the boiler of a locomotive on a morning Lake Shore train, on Sunday morning, March 21st. The particulars of the accident are given in the following article in the daily papers:
