DARING ADMIRAL WORDEN.

His Dash Represents of Honor in the Monitor-Marine Corps.

"The important part which opportunity plays in the lives of men is well illustrated by the career of the late Admiral Worden," remarked Captain Lewis N. Hodder, of the United States revenue cutter service a few days ago.

"It was Worden's good luck that he was assigned to the Monitor, for the result of the fight made the vessel and all on board famous.

"The heavy part he played in the fight was recognized by congress, and he was rapidly promoted to high rank, which other officers obtained only after 20 years of service.

"I remember him well when he first came on board the Monitor about a month before the fight. He had just been released from prison and looked thin and sallow. He had the appearance of one trying from fever complaints, never thought it possible for him to live long.

"During the fight he was cool and collected. I recall an incident which I do not remember ever seeing published. The pilot house was situated in the bow of the Monitor, quite away from the turret. During the fight I was in the turret with other officers, when suddenly we saw Lieutenant Worden climbing up where we were. Without saying anything, he opened one of the turret doors and stepped out on the deck in full view of the enemy.

"'Why, captain, what's the trouble?' exclaimed several of the officers in astonishment at his fearless act.

"'I can't see well enough from the pilot house,' came the quiet reply, 'I want to get out here for a moment to take in the whole situation.' Then, looking around for a few moments, he turned inside.

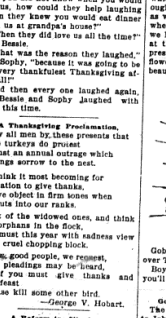

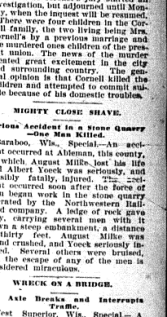

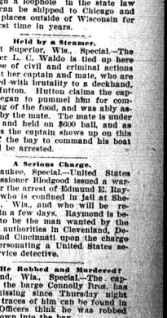

Fall Thirty Feet to Death.

Miss Carrie Handley, aged 18 years, daughter of J. R. Handley, of East Brainerd, fell into a well Tuesday evening and was instantly killed. The family live in the building formerly used as the third ward school house and the well at which the accident happened is in a yard across the street from where they live and is 30 feet deep. The curbing around the well above the ground is 18 inches or two feet high and the well is the old washhouse kind. Around the outside of the curb was a mass of ice sloping away from the well. The unfortunate girl had drawn a bucket of water and emptied it into her pail and was setting the bucket back over the curbing when her feet slipped out from under her and she plunged headfirst into the well. A boy seven or eight years old was the only witness of the fatal accident and he grabbed at the girl's feet as she went down and succeeded in holding her for a few seconds but was unable to extricate her from her perilous position and had to let go of his hold in order to save himself. The boy gave the alarm at once and a man was lowered into the well by a rope and brought the body to the surface but life was extinct. A physician was called and an examination showed that no bones were broken and also that the lungs were free from water and it is supposed that the girl was dead before she struck the bottom of the well. The funeral was held yesterday afternoon from the German Evangelical church in East Brainerd, Rev. Mat. Hansen officiating.

HIS GRIM PROSPECT.

AMERICAN STONE MASONS' LIFE ENDS WITH HIS JOB.

The Handwork of Years in Mexico to the Crowd With Death by Shaking—The Head Killed a Citian—A Military Guard Watch Him.

He can't for the life of his flesh that job. He has had seven years of labor, and, according to all ancient and modern laws, he is entitled to seven years of rest. But he doesn't want to rest. He doesn't crave a moment of it. He doesn't ask for a holiday.

He works to live, and the only reason he is permitted to live is because he works, because his work is necessary to the completion of a thing of beauty, which is destined to be a joy forever to the good people of San Luis Potosi and their descendants after them. When his labor is finished, his handiwork will be covered by a volley of bullets fired straight at his heart by a file of the most expert marksmen in the Mexican army.

That's why he doesn't hurry. That's why the decoration of the town hall, which millions and millions of dollars have been spent, grows so slowly. Careful competitors say that this artisan will probably finish the job by the year 1900, figuring on his present and past rate of execution.

San Luis Potosi prides itself on that hall. When it is completed, it is to be the eighth wonder of the world. There shall be no more beside it. A dream of the most skillful stone masons the state of Pennsylvania could turn out were imported seven years ago to do the mental carving on its front. They were well up in all branches of their art and the exterior of the hall grew beautiful and more beautiful under their educated guiding fingers.

The Potosi natives found life in this many dreamy, wondrous city. They had their timid eyes, their thin, their fragrant fragrances and its incense, and all menagerie. They fitted with the burnished beauties, they blew the scented smoke of the holy cigars through their American noses and they tucked glass after glass of the spirit of the center under their noses trying outing shirts.

One Fourth of July the American flag and the Mexican eagle came to the square. They mist it up. After the revelry ceased was finished and the reveler made had cleared away it was found that the "ragged" population of San Luis Potosi had been decreased by one, and that the American colony had increased the loss by eight of the finest of its members. The other Americans stood slightly aghast at the deceased Mexican, and when the police came to the station he made no resistance to arrest.

He should be shot. He had killed a citizen, and he must die. But the carrying on the new city hall. The American's companion had died. He alone in all San Luis Potosi could go on with the work. Will he do it? He should continue the decorations, and when he planned death should be his. The penalty was deferred, not remitted. A pleasant prospect for an American! Hardly sensitive to heroic exertion or even moderate speed. And so the workman went at his task with much the same idea of prolonging it as an amateur the grided space writer who elaborates a paragraph into a page.

He works not with mad haste, nor yet with an attention to detail which is to his results is pleasing to the artistic eye of the art-loving Mexican, while it yet calls his spirit, which cries aloud for the life of this deliberate American.

The workman lights his pipe and climbs slowly to his platform on the edge of the arch white wall and with chisel and hammer calmly and carefully shapes away at his griffin's head. Far below, in the busy Mexican street, a file of San Luis Potosi soldiers stand, with guns, ready to intercept any attempt to escape which the stone mason may make.

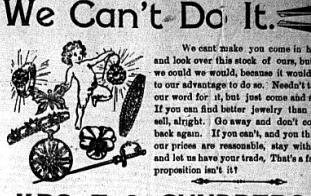

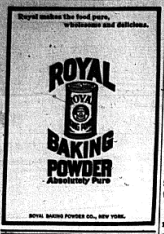
