## THE ANCIENT ORDER OF HIBERNIANS.

Eighth Biennial Session of the Order Held in Brainerd on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday.

The eighth biennial state convention of the Ancient Order of Hibernians which was in session in this city on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of the present week, concluded its business yesterday and nearly all of the delegates have returned to their homes carrying with them kindly remembrances of their visit to the City of the Pines and the best wishes of the people of Brainerd who did every thing in their power to make their stay a pleasant and profitable one.
