DEWEY'S VICTORY

The Atlantic Squadron Proves too Much for the Spanish Fleet at Manila and COMPLETELY ANNIHILATES IT. No Direct News Yet Received from Commodore Dewey but it is Generally Believed that he is Master of Manila Bay.

Brainerd Firmly Celebrates the Big American Victory. The Pioneer Press says that the following telegram received by F. T. Viles of Boston, from a friend in Singapore, was read at the banquet of the electric light club to-night: "Singapore, May 5, 1898.—Reliable information received here corroborates the news of Dewey's victory at Manila, and he is now exercising the duties of governor general there." Full accounts of the fight at Manila will be found on the inside pages. Lack of ammunition prevented the Spanish fleet from sailing for American waters. The latest report is that the queen regent of Spain will resign and return to Vienna. A special from Washington says Admiral Sampson and the fighting division of the North Atlantic squadron are sailing toward Puerto Rico to meet the Spanish Armada and wipe it off the ocean. Men and arms have been landed on the Cuban coast by a government tug and communication with the insurgents established.

We Celebrate. When the news of Commodore Dewey's famous victory at the Philippine islands reached Brainerd on Monday morning and the announcement was made that the Spanish fleet had practically been wiped off the face of the earth or sunk to the bottom of the sea, the city went wild. At the Northern Pacific shops the enthusiasm knew no bounds, the steam whistles were blown continuously until noon and a half holiday was given the employes. Cannons boomed from the first announcement until eight o'clock and fireworks were practically a standstill. At one o'clock Dr. S. H. City Band paraded the streets followed by an impromptu procession of citizens on foot and in carriages everyone displaying the national colors. The northern Pacific Band with a procession of people from East and Southeast Brainerd also paraded the streets and taking it altogether it was as lively a day as Brainerd has seen in many a year.

ETCHING BY ELECTRICITY.

A. Werner of Minneapolis has made an important discovery. A Werner, a well known diverter of Milwaukee, has discovered a method by which signs, pictures and drawings can be made in the most perfect manner of photography and electricity, and the invention may cause a revolution in the etching method. The process is interesting. In the first place a drawing must be made on the sign or plate. This drawing is photographed and the photograph transferred to a metal plate which may be of zinc, brass, copper, bronze, silver or any other metal. The drawing is then hung on a copper wire into a tank of the liquid deep enough to fill with the metal dust. At this point the electric current is applied to the plate. The plate is then washed, dried and varnished with a coating expressly prepared for this purpose. This process it saves the trouble of painting. Signs which are exposed continually to the weather require deep etching and heavy sanding, so that they can be cleaned without injuring the surface. The same process may be applied to pictures and post drawings and the copies will last for 1,000 years. The plates have been held at which sharp and distinct—Milwaukee Wisconsin.

Where a purchaser bought and paid for all the standing timber on a tract of land and received a written receipt from the owner, in which it was stipulated that the purchaser was to have four years to take off said timber, and was to take it clean, and no logging was made of a forfeiture, the Supreme Court of Indiana held (last week) that the purchaser was not liable to remove the timber within four years did not forfeit the right to it. The court based its decision on the ground that the law does not take effect until it is enforced, and in the absence of clearly stated conditions of forfeiture.

During the course of the discussion which recently took place in the Senate on the subject of the sugar duties in that country, some interesting figures were quoted showing the progress of the sugar industry in the three sugar producing countries, Germany, France and Austria. During the year 1912 France exported 42,000 tons of sugar, Germany 25,000 tons and Austria 18,000 tons, while twenty years later France had to import 1,200 tons, Germany produced 1,800,000 tons, Austria 1,200,000 tons. In 1912 France exported 20,000 tons of sugar, Austria 14,000 and Germany 21,000, while in 1913 Germany exported 1,600,000 tons, Austria 1,000,000 and France 180,000 tons. In France in 1913 amounted to 42,000 tons and in Germany to 25,000 tons. The total sugar produced in France in 1913 was 1,200,000 tons, in 1912 1,200,000 tons, in 1911 1,200,000 tons, in 1910 1,200,000 tons. The quantity of sugar consumed per head of the population in Germany, France and Austria amounted respectively to 267, 278 and 162 pounds.

In the last four years, according to Consul Dickey, at Calcutta, only one cargo of wheat has been sent from the United States to India. The reason why it is not able to explain, but says that the cargo referred to went from San Francisco in October last year. "The total import of wheat into India during the year 1912," says the census report, "amounted to 22,613,722 kilograms (50,242,270 pounds). These figures show that wheat supplies the principal market for wheat and flour. But why Chile and not the United States should supply the Peruvian market when our products are far superior to those of Chile I do not know. The fact is that the duty on freight wheat from Chile, which I can tell you is only 4 cents (16.00 a ton). The consular officials of Peru and of other countries of the Pacific coast of South and Central America is to establish a free line of commerce between San Francisco, Chile, combined with the present line of commerce between New York and the west coast of South America, would greatly help the United States in retaining the trade that the one had with this coast.

SPAIN'S ASIATIC SQUADRON COMPLETELY DEFEATED.

Great Naval Battle at Manila, in the Philippine Islands—American Squadron Under Commodore Dewey Administers a Crushing Defeat to the Spanish Squadron—All News of the Big Battle Comes From Spanish Sources—Spain Loses Three of Her Largest Ships, One of Them Being Blown Up—American Ships Suffer Severe Damage—Spaniards Lose 200 Killed and 400 Wounded—American Loss of Life Not Known—Great Work of Uncle Sam's Gunners.

St. Paul, May 3.—The Pioneer Press prints the following correspondent cable from the London correspondent of the New York Herald:

The Asiatic squadron of the United States, Commodore Dewey commanding, yesterday engaged and completely defeated the Asiatic squadron of Spain in the harbor of Manila in the Philippine Islands.
