New Revenue Law.
The Brainerd banks are sending out circulars to their customers explaining the workings of the new revenue law so far as it relates to their business. After July 31st every bank check or draft must have a two cent revenue stamp attached to be affixed by drawer and cancelled by having the initials and the date stamped or written thereon. Promissory notes must bear stamps at the rate of two cents for every \$100 or fractional part thereof to be affixed and canceled in the same manner as above, and failure to affix said stamp will subject the drawer of checks or maker of note or bank paying or negotiating the same to a heavy penalty. The circular will fully explain the matter.

REPUBLICAN COUNTY CONVENTION.

One of the Most Harmonious Meetings in the History of the Party in Crow Wing County is Held.

A Delegation Favorable to Van Santleloot to the State Convention.

Delegates are Elected to the Legislative Convention Who will Work for the Nomination of A. F. Ferris and W. A. Fleming as Representatives.

The Republican county convention was called to order at 9 p. m. yesterday afternoon by Chairman John T. Frater. In opening the convention Mr. Frater addressed the assembly, the progress the party had made during the past two years. After this came the reading of the official call. Milton McFadden was elected chairman and A. Mahlum secretary.

A committee on credentials was appointed consisting of Chas. Kreeb, C. A. Wilkins and C. B. Thompson, who reported the following delegates as entitled to seats in the convention: First Ward—Geo. E. Gardner, F. M. Lagerquist, Chas. Wilkins, C. B. Rowley, D. W. Whitford, L. W. Burck, Martin Orig.

Fourth ward—A. Mahlum, Henry Anderson, John Larson, J. W. Anderson, T. W. Crawford, Peter Stensdal.

Fifth Ward—W. H. Crowell, C. B. White, M. Mahlum, W. H. Thompson, F. H. Grosshagen, C. B. Thompson, A. E. Veon.

Sixth Ward—A. T. Kimball, W. W. Walker.

Delegates—Henry Spalding, C. A. Kreeb, Seymour Clark.

Crow Wing—Jost Smith.

Maple Grove—A. Hall.

St. Matthias—J. H. Gibson, Louis T. Menard.

Geo. D. LaBar and W. H. Crowell were appointed tellers.

After the report of the committee was adopted a motion was made to proceed to the election of twelve delegates to the state convention, and the following gentlemen were unanimously chosen:

A. F. Ferris, W. A. Fleming, J. N. Nevers, N. H. Ingersoll, H. Spalding, A. J. Halsted, J. T. Frater, J. J. Hore, Jas. McMearty, Jost Smith, John Larson and S. R. Adair.

A motion was then made by J. N. Nevers to proceed to the election of seven delegates to the legislative convention for the 48th district, and the following delegates were elected without a dissenting vote:

N. H. Ingersoll, F. B. Johnson, John Willis, J. C. Davis, F. S. Parker, J. L. Borg, Harry Patterson, T. W. Crawford, Wm. Breadfield.

The following resolutions were adopted:

We the Republicans of Crow Wing county in convention assembled, do hereby resolve: That we endorse and approve the patriotic and American administration of President McKinley and heartily commend his course in connection with the war with Spain, believing that the people of Cuba should be freed, and that the Maine should be destroyed, and we rejoice that the American people, North and South, are united in maintaining the government in this war and that the last vestige of colonial strife has been forever swept away.

That in the pending war with Spain we implore the blessing of Almighty God for the success of our arms and earnestly pray that the right may prevail and suffering humanity may be freed from the tyranny of a despotic government.

Resolved further that we endorse the course taken by our representatives in both branches of the national legislature and recognize in this their heroism and patriotism and patriotic public services.

A motion was then made and unanimously carried that John T. Frater be elected chairman of the county committee for the ensuing two years with power to appoint the balance of the committee, and that the committee have power to appoint an executive committee.

The convention then adjourned.

The republican convention for Cass county was held at Sylvan Lake yesterday and a delegation favorable to VanSant for governor was elected as follows: T. H. May, J. Bonch, C. E. Griffith, Seth Phillips, N. Palmer, J. Clark.

PRIZES TAKEN IN WAR.

Their Disposition and Division of the Proceeds.

THE RIGHTS OF THE CAPTORS. Capture of an Enemy's Ship Does Not Convey Any Title to the Vessel or Its Cargo.

The validity with which the Atlantic squadron has been capturing schooners and ketches in the West Indies and the enormous aggregate value of these prizes raises the question as to their disposition and the apportionment of the proceeds.

The prize money is taken on the high sea or in territorial waters of one of the belligerent powers and must be taken by an armed vessel duly commissioned by the sovereign of the captor.

Proceeds the balance is distributed among the captors.

The first "prize money" has a wider significance than the term "prize" and extends to any vessel captured by the state for the capture of enemy's property.

The capture of an enemy's ship does not convey any title to the vessel or its cargo. Where the prize must be taken by an armed vessel duly commissioned by the sovereign of the captor.

The St. Cloud Journal-Press of Wednesday says: An important suit was partially tried before Judge Searle this morning, and the cause of the defendants is suggestive of the hot old political times of 1884, when Chas. F. Kindred and Katie Nelson disputed for political supremacy in the old Fifth district, and when every Republican in the district took active sides for one or the other, and it was a fight to the death.

The action today is that of the First National Bank of Brainerd against Chas. F. and Sara E. Kindred of Philadelphia, and the amount sued for including damages is \$20,000. The only witness examined was A. F. Fair, president of the bank, and the arguments were made later by W. S. McClelland for the plaintiff corporation, and C. A. Severance of St. Paul for the defendants.
