## PAGE MORRIS ADDRESSES

An Enthusiastic Audience Listen to Congressman Morris at Gardner Hall on Tuesday Evening.

Hon. Page Morris spoke on Tuesday evening at Gardner hall to a large and attentive audience. Judge W. A. Fleming made a few preliminary remarks and introduced Judge Morris. Mr. Morris opened his remarks by explaining how two years ago he became the republican nominee for congress. He was at that time district judge at Duluth and was content to remain in that position, but the district united in tendering him the nomination and he accepted, making a campaign for the republican party and was elected. During his term in congress he had served his constituents to the best of his ability and had again received an unanimous nomination from his party and was again before the people as the representative of republican principles. His opponent, C. A. Towne, had requested in certain localities that the audience ask him certain questions and he was prepared to answer them even though the request was not made. Mr. Morris then proceeded to puncture the statements made by Towne and succeeded in convincing his hearers that Towne was endeavoring to mislead the public in his oratorical efforts in many ways, especially in regard to the appropriation for the Duluth harbor.

Towne also wanted to know why he had voted to authorize the administration to issue \$300,000,000 in bonds. No man could do that at that time what the war would cost. Only so much of the bonds were to be issued as was necessary. This act had

been passed in 1891 and the government was prepared to wage a successful war, and that the administration was backed by the wealth and resources of this great country. Only \$200,000,000 had been issued and no more would be issued. He had voted for these bonds because he was opposed to the issuance of irredeemable paper, and he had confidence enough in William McKinley to believe that he would use what was necessary and no more. And this belief had been justified by subsequent events and no patriotic citizen would take issue with congress on this proposition.

Mr. Morris then touched upon the importance of the tariff and compared the financial standing of the country now to what it was in 1896. He contradicted a statement some papers had published that he had said the money question was not an issue. He considered this question now as much of an issue today as it ever was. He told about the tariff on lumber, which under the Dingley bill was free, and how he had succeeded in getting a \$2 tariff, Towne trying to have it remain on the free list.

The congressman then discussed at some length the record of the republican party on the question of protection, public revenue and trade expansion. He repeated the well known reasons why the Republicans did not expect the Dingley law to be as successful as it was because of the tariff and free trade of the Wilson bill. When the Dingley law

finally went into effect the stocks of foreign goods recently imported flooded the market, and importations were very small for many months. As the stocks of imported goods decreased, the importations gradually approached to normal amount, and in February 1898, the receipts of government from tariffs and internal revenues exceeded the expenses. Since then the duties on imports and the ordinary internal revenue taxes had brought into the treasury \$10,000,000 more than the running expenses of the government. These computations were exclusive of receipts from war revenue sources and land sales, as well as war expenses.

The record of the nation's foreign commerce under the first year of the Dingley law was the most satisfactory in the history of the country. The exports exceeded \$1,500,000,000 and the imports were \$600,000,000, leaving a balance of trade of \$900,000,000, by far the largest ever known. So that the Dingley bill had not only proved to be a revenue producer, but foreign trade had been developed.

In closing Mr. Morris paid an eloquent tribute to President McKinley and Senators Davis and Nelson and urged upon his hearers the necessity of electing a republican legislator.

A democratic convention to nominate candidates for city offices was held at the court house last night. Jas. Cummings was elected chairman and J. W. Koop secretary. Delegates from all wards except the first were present. After offering a permanent organization, Mr. Tooley from the third ward moved that as the call was issued in error to be held on the 28th, there be no nominations, but endorse those already made. The motion did not receive a second.

Council Meeting.

The city council met in special session on Monday evening. All aldermen being present except Alderman Mohled.

The city clerk was instructed to write to Mr. L. H. Johnson and inform him that the council would not comply with his request to have money for cost of building East Brainerd bridge appropriated in advance and placed in a third party hands, he to give bonds for proper performance of contract.

Report of engineer concerning cost of building a road across marsh in West Brainerd was accepted, and matter of putting in road was referred to street committee with power to act.

A resolution was adopted that \$14000 be raised by taxation for city purposes as follows:

Sinking fund.....\$1400

Interest on bond and other debt.....7000

Current expenses city.....5500

Assessment roll for repair on sidewalks was adopted, also assessment roll for new sidewalk as provided for by resolution of Aug. 3, 1888.

On motion the clerk was instructed to notify L. P. White and Mrs. L. M. Follett to have their buildings on 5th street taken down on or before Nov. 7th, or city will have same done at their expense.

The city property committee was instructed to sell one half of the wood in the city park.

The city clerk was instructed to procure flags for the different polling precincts.

Council adjourned.

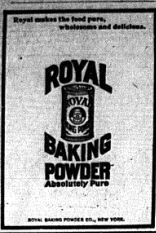
