Good Thing for the County.

House File No. 83, a bill introduced by Representative Ferris and which has become a law, provides that county commissioners may issue bonds any time before July 1st, 1899, for the purpose of refunding the floating indebtedness of any county which has accumulated previous to May 1st, 1899. The commissioners of this county will take advantage of the new law and at their next meeting will call for bids for bonds in an amount adequate to take up all outstanding orders.

Machinists Get an Increase.

The Northern Pacific has granted its machinists a raise of 11 cents an hour, which will go into effect the first of May. For some years the company has paid its machinists 27 1/2 cents an hour. Several days ago a committee of the men waited upon the officials of the road with the request that the rate be made 30 cents. The request was not granted, but a satisfactory compromise was effected providing for a rate of 29 cents.—Minneapolis Times.

Barns Burned.

On Wednesday the fire department was called out to a small barn in Southeast Brainerd. To its small barn were practically destroyed, one belonging to John Boyle and the other to August Erickson. The barns were both small and the loss on both will not exceed \$200. Mr. Erickson's barn was insured for \$500. He lost over a ton of hay. There was considerable delay in getting water because the fire hydrant is at the corner of 15th and Pine streets was frozen.

A new passenger coach was also ordered, and will arrive May 1st, when, it is expected, an exclusive passenger train will run instead of a mixed train as at present. The other coaches of the company will be thoroughly overhauled and refitted and put in first-class shape. 132 new flat cars of 30,000 pounds capacity were ordered, and are arriving daily. When this new equipment is all here, the company will be in first-class shape.

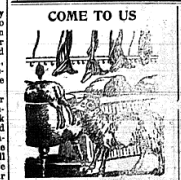

Relief at Last.

The city council at its meeting on Monday night passed an ordinance restraining cattle from running at large in the city.

THE CATTLE NUISANCE ABATED.

The city council met in regular session on Monday night, all members being present.

The legislature has adjourned until the next session.

Diplomatic relations with Spain have been resumed.

A Mr. Tallgren was elected United States senator from Florida on Wednesday.

The Pennsylvania legislature adjourned without electing a United States senator.

It is now reported that Speaker Reed will retire from political life and has accepted a position in a New York law office at \$50,000 a year.

The present legislature increased the wolf bounty to \$7 a head for the first five months in the year, and \$5 the other seven months.

The daily papers are doing their best to force Alger out of the cabinet, and a great deal of feeling in the country has been manufactured against him.

The California legislature has passed a law requiring all newspaper articles that in any manner reflect on the dead or criticize the living to be signed by the writer of the article.

The city property committee was instructed to confer with the county commissioners with regard to securing office room for the city clerk in the court house.

The matter of opening up an alley in block 19, Sleeper's addition was referred to the street committee.

The New Game Laws.

The new game law which was passed by the legislature just closed is a matter of considerable interest to many of the people in this section of Minnesota, and while the law in its entirety will be published in the Dispatch in a short time, a synopsis of it at this time will not be out of place.

The bill in regard to wolf bounties, which finally became a law, increases the bounty to \$7 for a full-grown wolf if killed during the first five months of the year, and \$5 if killed during the other seven; increases the bounty for cubs to \$3, and provides that the carcass is to be presented to the town clerk, and the proof forwarded by him to the county auditor, who is to draw his warrant for the proper amount.

The street committee reported that the bid of Mr. Berresford for furnishing shade trees for \$184 was lowest, but that one year was not long enough to guarantee life of trees, and ask that the time be extended to 18 months, and that Mr. Berresford be given ten days to communicate with the committee to accept same.

O. B. Rowley was granted an extension of two weeks time from April 18th to complete the ravine bridge providing the Surety Co. consented.

The council then, without a dissenting vote, passed ordinance No. 148, restraining cattle from running at large in the city at any time.

The matter of repairing sidewalks throughout the city was referred to the street committee with power to act.

Request of O. P. Erickson for a permit to build a barn near the hay market was granted.

On motion \$100 was appropriated to secure suitable views of the city to be published in the Tribune supplement, and the mayor, Ald. Cohn and Low were appointed a committee to select the said views.

Auditor Mahlum was extended a vote of thanks for repairing sidewalks throughout the city was referred to the street committee with power to act.

The election of officers of the fire department were confirmed.

On motion it was ordered that if only one sanitary police be appointed his salary be \$10 a month.

The clerk was instructed to notify the board of health to use the city team for sanitary work.

The city property committee was instructed to confer with the county commissioners with regard to securing office room for the city clerk in the court house.

The auditor was instructed to aid the Bicycle Association to control the reckless riding of bicycles upon the street and sidewalks in the city, and if the nuisance cannot be abated by this means the mayor is instructed to enforce the ordinance prohibiting riding on the sidewalks at all.
