From the Seat of War.  
Rev. G. W. Gallagher received the following letter today from his son, George.

Near Malolos, April 10, '99.  
DEAR FATHER:—There has been practically no change in our lines for a few days. We are somewhere about fifty miles from Manila. Something will happen very shortly. The campaign must, from our standpoint, be continued for some time. These people intend to fight. They are such fools that they do not know when they are whipped. When I wrote you my last letter we were beyond the water works. We are now considerably the other side of Malolos, the capital of the insurgents. You have probably seen in the papers about the fighting. It has been very something terrible, beyond description. There were thousands of men lying in the trenches. A little further we passed two lying in a field, then four dead in a straw stack. On our return we picked up a wounded insurgent and carried him along with us. On the ground where Co. I, my company, did the fighting, there were eight dead and wounded insurgents. That was a good record for Co. I. Gen. Hays was with our company during the fight. We had such hard marching. One night we marched all night, and still kept on through the next day. I tell you it is no snap to march like that in poor rations in this climate. We volunteers feel bitter. The regulars are saved and we do the fighting. We enlisted to fight Spain, and not to fightiggers. Politics will never let us forget some things about this war. I must stop. Love to all. Your loving son,

### A SUCCESSFUL GATHERING.

Meeting of the Duluth Conference of Congregational Churches.

The Duluth Conference of Congregational Churches, including Look, Crow Wing, Cass, Aitkin, St. Louis and Itasca counties, met Tuesday and Wednesday of this week with the First Congregational church. The day and evening services were very inspiring and enthusiastic. The conference was opened by the retiring moderator, Rev. G. W. Gallagher. Rev. Alexander Miller, pastor of the Pilgrim church, Duluth, was elected moderator, and Rev. C. B. Bortel, of Aitkin, scribe. Tuesday morning was occupied by reports from the churches. On Tuesday afternoon Rev. G. F. Morton, of East Brainerd, read a paper on "Sunday School Work," and Rev. C. B. Bortel a paper on "War as a Factor in Civilization." In the evening Rev. A. Milne preached the annual sermon from St. Luke 12:24, an able, eloquent and interesting discourse. The sacrament of the Lord's Supper was also observed. On Wednesday morning Rev. F. A. Shaw, of Walker, read a paper on "Christian Endeavor Work," and Rev. F. A. Sumner, of Little Falls, a paper on "Relation of Our Churches to Revivals." On Wednesday afternoon Rev. F. D. Bentley, of Duluth, read a paper on "The Ways and Means of Developing Missionary Interest in Our Churches." All these papers were very interesting and instructive. At 3 o'clock on Wednesday afternoon Mrs. G. Chapman, of Duluth, took charge of the "Women's Work in the Churches." This consisted of a series of papers and discussions on topics especially connected with women's work in the congregational churches. Some of these papers were as follows: "Sunday School Work," by Mrs. R. P. Boyington, of Duluth; "Prayer Meeting," by Mrs. Townsend, of East Brainerd; "Social Life of the Church," by Mrs. W. McMillin, of Duluth; "Foreign Missions," by Miss Field, read by Mrs. F. A. Sumner; "A Visit to Our Minnesota Missionaries," read by Mrs. J. N. Nevers; "Why Do We Give to Missions," by Mrs. Rev. G. W. Gallagher. The papers were followed by a finely rendered solo song by Mrs. Chester Atherton. The evening session closed the conference. Rev. E. H. Stickney, of Fargo, N. D., and Rev. J. H. Morley, of Minneapolis, delivering special addresses on "Sunday School" and "Home Missionary" subjects.

## \$25,000,000 in Gold.

The Salmon and Clearwater placer mines in Idaho, according to Wall Fargo Express Company's report, have yielded in gold dust and nuggets from thirty-eight to forty million dollars between 1890 and '94.

Notwithstanding the difficulties of transportation in those days, remittance from civilization, and hostile Indians the fame of the rich gold placers around Elk City, Florence, Oro Fino and Millersburg reached the outside world, and a stampede marked the opening of the mines.

The historian, long ago expressed the belief that these placer mines were but the outskirts of wealthings of a richer central deposit, and almost simultaneously with the recent completion of the Northern Pacific's Lewiston, Idaho, extension from Spokane, comes the announcement that prospectors have discovered immense ledges of gold bearing quartz in the Buffalo Hump range lying between the Salmon and the South Fork of the Clearwater Line.
