RED MEN ARE COMING.

Braierd Will Entertain the Great Council of the State Improved O. R. M. Next Week.

Great preparations are being made by the members of the local organization to royally entertain the delegates who will attend the state meeting of their organization in this city on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of next week. The meeting is one of considerable importance to Braierd, as it will bring hundreds of visitors here from various parts of the state and it is the desire of all to treat the guests in such a manner that when they depart they will have the most kindly feeling for our city and its citizens. We can reap a benefit of a lasting nature from a state meeting of so much importance as the coming one and it is with this object in view that our friends are taking such a lively interest in giving the visitors a royal welcome.

The programme, while not entirely complete, is nearly so, and there is no need to doubt but that entertainment will be furnished from start to finish. The delegates will begin to arrive on Monday morning and at noon the tribe from Duluth will reach the city by special train bringing their own band, the other delegates reaching the city from the west at 12 o'clock and south at 12:30, and it is also expected that a large number of members from Walker will arrive in the city over the R. & N. M. on that day.

On Monday afternoon there will be an interesting game of base ball at Swartz Driving Park between the West Duluth and Braierd nine. Besides the ball game there will be horse racing and other sports, and an admission of 25 cents will be charged. On Monday evening the Past Sachems will hold a business meeting followed by an elaborate banquet at the Arlington Hotel.

Tuesday morning a business session of the Grand Council will be held in Columbian block. The grand parade will take place at 2 p. m., starting from the Columbian block on Sixth street, and it will unquestionably be a sight worth seeing. Several of the larger cities are preparing to compete for the prize of \$100 offered for the tribe having the largest number of members in line in the parade, a second prize of \$50 going to the tribe having the next largest number, and as the prizes are tempting it is expected that they will have a tendency to largely increase the number of braves usually in attendance at the great council meetings. After the parade the business meeting will again be resumed.

On Tuesday evening Red Cloud Tribe will tender the visiting members a grand ball at Gardner Hall which will be largely attended. On Wednesday morning the business of the session will be finished and the balance of the day will be spent in visiting the various places of interest in and about the city.
