The first papers sent between the United States and any European country has been established with Germany, under a convention signed last month. It will go into operation on the first of October and will allow of the exchange of articles of merchandise by mail between the two countries, provided the parcels do not weigh more than eleven pounds. The postage rate is fixed at twenty cents a pound. Such arrangements promote international friendship as well as trade.

A great American merchant once treated me generally as an English customer whom morality and equity might have seriously embarrassed in his business. It is in such a neighborly spirit that the United States and Canada should treat the settlement of the Alaska boundary. A French scientist has been experimenting with pneumatic tires and gases and has made some interesting discoveries. An automobile that is proposed to differ the tires of the frame with carbolic acid gas, but the scientist discovered that the gas, at high pressure would render the rubber as hard as a soap. He there proceeded to investigate the effects of ordinary air upon the tires, and in the course of his experiments found that the composition of the air in a pneumatic tire speeds through the oxygen excepted through the tubing at a more rapid rate than the nitrogen. Even the best tires are permeable. It is now proposed to inflate tires with pure hydrogen in order to save the trouble of frequent resort to the air pump.

M. Jules Roche, the former French Minister of Commerce and president of the new French Taxpayers League, has just published a pamphlet on the financial situation in France, which contains some striking figures. He argues that to form a correct view of the present financial situation in France it is necessary to go back at least as far as 1874, when the interest to be paid on the loans contracted for the Franco-Prussian war was already allotted to the budget. In that year the budget amounted to 2,470,000,000 francs. The draft budget for 1899 amounts to 3,474,000,000 francs, showing an increase about 100% of \$11,000,000 francs. The average annual increase in expenditures has, therefore, been 3,000,000 francs, or rather, when various considerations of the public debt are taken into consideration, 42,000,000 francs. With regard to the windfall of 416,000,000 francs per annum which the state will have at its disposal in 1900, when the railways of France become its property, M. Roche points out that the profits of the railways in France will have more increased in that time. Its estimate of the growth of traffic that the net profits of the railways will be at least 1,000,000,000 francs.

The experiment of uniting recruits in Porto Rico for the United States army has proved successful, and the Porto Rican battalion of volunteers has been fully organized. The American officers who have recruited the battalion report that the men are obedient and willing to learn, and that they take great pride in being soldiers of the United States army.

AN IMPORTANT FOOD LAW.
Heavy Penalties For Selling Adulterated Food.
The following law was passed at the session of the Vermont Legislature, taking effect August 20, 1899:

SECTION 5018.—Whoever shall be guilty of adulterating any food or article intended for use as food, or of selling any such adulterated food or article, shall be deemed guilty of a crime, and shall be punished by a fine of not less than one hundred dollars, and not more than five hundred dollars, or by imprisonment for not less than six months, and not more than two years.

The operation of this law will be the result of the Vermont Legislature. The manufacture of such a fine article of food or article intended for use as food which contains any of the substances proscribed by the law is absolutely prohibited.

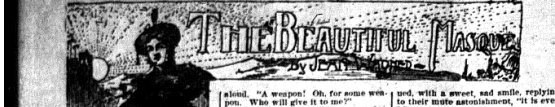

REBELS ON THE RUN

REBELS ON THE RUN. SERIES OF SHARP ENCOUNTERS. American Loss Two Killed, a Captain Wounded—Advances Made a General Attack Upon the American Lines, but After Strong Resistance Were Driven Back to the Street—Loyalists' Troops Moved to Another.

Manila, Oct. 4.—The Fourth Infantry Regiment, Maj. Price, commanding, has had a series of encounters with the insurgents about noon since Saturday. A captain and a corporal of the American forces were killed and eight men were wounded. A Filipino soldier is known to have been killed.

Maj. Price requested Admiral Watson to send five gunboats to his assistance. The five gunboats were on Saturday when Capt. Brown took the main attack that distinguished itself at Iloilo de la Cabana against a large force of insurgents. The troops, being in the main in the river beds, kept up a stiff fire for hours and a later, when reinforcements were sent to them until several boats were sunk. The insurgents retreated.
