## McLENNAN IN LINE.

Principles of the G. O. P. Agree With His Political Ideas.

The St. Paul Dispatch of Tuesday contained the following:

At Magee's today there was registered W. S. McLennan, of Brainerd, for years city attorney of that municipality, and a very prominent Sixth district democrat of the Bourbons stamp. In the attitude of those who claim to be successors in interest of the old-time democracy he finds features so repugnant that he can no longer champion their conditions.

"Expansion obtrains among many of us as we were old time democrats because we were Americans above partisanship," said Mr. McLennan. "Partisanship is the opposition to the war with Spain two years ago, notwithstanding that it devolved upon a republican administration to prosecute our part of the conflict. Our flag flies over the islands still claims sympathy and support, though in a modified degree. What is more direct in its bearing, however, is the accomplished fact of expansion. Our flag flies over the islands, and the authority of the United States in the islands will soon be unquestioned, even by the turbulent adventurers who have sought the organization of a republic solely for selfish advantage.

"The practical man, viewing the acquisition of territory as complete and final, finds very little substance in anti-expansion, therefore he does not deal in arguments of commercial growth and the desirability of trade development, because every thing argument could accomplish has assumed a definite state. We have the Philippines. If the practical man has not been a republican, he turns naturally to that creed because it and it alone takes cognizance of present day conditions. And as an American he prefers to think of his government as broad, progressive, resourceful and confident of its power in dealing with responsibilities, rather than to be compelled to admit that it has exhibited irresponsibility, declined to occupy a field of international influence, and weakly resigned territory of which formal possession had been taken.

"Undoubtedly our first efforts at government of the Philippines will necessitate treatment of some very perplexing and complicated questions, but let these have attention as they present themselves. That they exist constitutes no reason for the surrender of our island possessions.

"The ideas of the republican party today accord more nearly with my own than they did even in 1896, the year in which the financial plank of the Chicago platform drove myself and other democrats from the support of the ticket."

## TOM LAWRENCE KILLED.

An Old Brainerd Citizen Crushed by The Cars at Staples.

On Wednesday morning word was received in this city that Tom Lawrence had been crushed by the cars and instantly killed at Staples. As Mr. Lawrence lived here for nearly 20 years, he had many friends who were deeply pained by the sad news.

About two o'clock yesterday morning Tom Lawrence, a switchman at this place, was crushed between two cars and so badly injured that he died in a few minutes. He was standing between the cars endeavoring to remove the link when the string of cars behind him was struck by a switch engine at the other end and the two cars came together with such force that the link was driven through his body. He gave one agonizing cry, and when the cars separated his lifeless body dropped to the ground. The remains were borne to Miller's undertaking room and prepared for burial.

Funeral services were held at the house this morning, conducted by Rev. G. L. Hunt. The remains will be taken to Brainerd tomorrow for burial.

The deceased was a native of Michigan and has been working as a switchman for over 20 years. He commenced at Michigan City, Ind. For more than 20 years he has been employed on the Northern Pacific, working at Brainerd until about two years ago, when he moved to this place. He leaves a wife and several children, the youngest about 11 years of age. They have the sympathy of

## COMMITTED SUICIDE.

Charles Johnson, of Southeast Brainerd, Cuts His Throat With a Razor.

Charles Johnson, of Southeast Brainerd, terminated his worldly existence on Tuesday by deliberately cutting his throat with a razor, severing the carotid artery and jugular vein. He also cut the veins in both wrists to make doubly sure that he would quit this vale of tears. No one saw the deed done, but the circumstances under which he was found lead no one to doubt that he destroyed his own life.

Mr. Johnson was an old resident, having lived here for years, and has been employed in the N. P. shops during the time. He has been ill for the past two years, undergoing two surgical operations in that time, the first for appendicitis and the last for rupture, and his health has been poorly otherwise, making him at times very nervous. He has not been able to work for the past two weeks, but Tuesday he was going to work as usual, being paid day the left home to go to the shops to get his time check. He did not return to the shops, and in the afternoon search was instituted but he was not found, no one having seen him. He did not call for his pay, so it was surmised, in his sick condition, he had wandered away and got lost. Search was continued on Wednesday and about five o'clock Wednesday afternoon Wm. Soderholm and Chas. Panton found him in an old boarding car standing on the track east of the foundry. He had, apparently, taken some food and made a pillow which he had rested his head. Then taking a razor from below the seat, he cut his throat from below the left ear to the center of the right. He also cut the veins in both wrists. The razor he dropped at his right side. Death must have resulted in a few moments.

The coroner was immediately summoned, but he decided to inquire no more. His remains were taken to Loscy & Dean's undertaking room to prepare them for burial. Mr. Johnson was 50 years of age, and had a large family, his wife and three children surviving him. He was a member of the local lodge of A. O. U. W., in which he had \$2,000 life insurance. The funeral will occur on Sunday at 2:30 at the Swedish Lutheran church. Rev. Johnson conducted the services. The A. O. U. W. lodge will attend in a body and conduct services at the grave.

Gov. Lind is in South Dakota endeavoring to help his friend Pettigrew out. The two men are very much alike in sentiment—a sentiment which is generally disliked by all loyal and patriotic citizens.

Van Sant is having things political all his own way these days and it is but just recognition of his loyalty to the party. His friends are legion and he will know them all even after he is elected governor of Minnesota.

Minnesota wire grants is fast taking the place of mania in the manufacture of all articles that the latter was used for. The industry is bound to increase to large proportions and Northern Minnesota will profit to a great extent thereby.

The Minnesota Editorial association did a very wise thing when they elected Cha. Mitchell president of that organization. Charlie is the right man in the right place and we predict that there will be no more pressure and fun infused into the coming outing than at any other time since the organization of the society.

The idea that Senator Clark, of Montana, bought his seat in the senate is absurd. By his own admission he only spent \$110,000 to secure his election, and as that is only \$10,000 for each member of the legislature, it is foolish to suggest such a cheap Montana legislature are not cheap.

The avidity with which the popular press pick up and exaggerate every little incident that they think will injure the administration indicates how hard up they are for an issue in the coming campaign. They know that free silver and anti-expansion are losing issues, hence they are turning to the trust question and trying to create prejudice against the administration on account of the Maerum incident. It will be of no avail, however. Populace success means free silver and that means business ruin.

A Desirable Accession. The interview with City Attorney McManahan in the St. Paul Dispatch of Tuesday produced little surprise. Maryland democrat though Mr. McManahan has been in years gone by his party never had a fetch before which he bowed down in ignorant and superstitious worship. Of this his numerous friends have not been ignorant. Never has he sacrificed on the altar of partisanship his privilege of independent thought, or his duty to the civilization of which every American should so proud.

Were the "anti-republicanism" of today the democracy of a decade ago, it might be worth while to examine critically the reasoning by which the views of an individual undergo transformation. But "democracy" today is not synonymous with the word employed in 1850. A new political alignment is taking place in every state in the union. Mr. McManahan declares himself a republican because in his judgment that party alone has the intelligence to grasp and comprehend "present day conditions."

The republicans of the Sixties were glad to extend him a hearty welcome. Men of his calibre are highly desirable accessories. They are natural leaders because they are sincere, because they think, and because they have the courage of their convictions.

THE FORFEITED TAX SALE.

People Should Take Warning in Time and Have Their Property from the Speculator.

The people of this county who are behind on their taxes should not forget the two tax sales which take place in May, for there is a vast difference. The regular list includes only those taxes for 1898, which still remain unpaid on the first Monday in January, 1900, while the forfeited list includes all unpaid taxes for the year 1898 and prior years. In the former there is a chance for redemption, but in the latter there is no redemption, the sale being absolute and title passes to the purchaser at once. Every owner of real estate should carefully examine the list published in the Dispatch and if he finds any of his property advertised it will be to his advantage to pay his taxes prior to May 7th, 1900, for at that time the land will be sold at public sale to the highest bidder and there is no chance thereafter for redemption. Parties whose land is valuable and who are waiting till the day of sale thinking they will be able to bid it in for 50 per cent of the taxes are taking great chances, for really real estate speculators and capitalists are listing all the desirable property advertised and it is not unlikely that on the day of sale they will be on hand and run the price up to double the amount of taxes and the real owner will be obliged to pay more than double the amount standing against it if he does not lose it entirely. It is a matter of every grave importance and the DISPATCH takes this opportunity to warn its readers of what the consequences may be far enough in advance so they may be able to make arrangements to protect themselves. In this connection every person behind on the tax for the year 1898, 1897 or 1898 on the same land should bear in mind that the tax for the last named years must also be paid in addition to the amount advertised before he can receive certificate from the county auditor that his taxes are paid. Thirty cents addition to the amount advertised in either list will have to be paid in order to cover clerk's fees and advertising. Every owner of land delinquent is notified in three different ways, first by postal card, then by publication and last by personal notice from the sheriff, no one should be misled and lose the opportunity to pay up if they so desire and save their property. It has been a large expense to the county and a great task for the county officials to get the list in proper shape, but the revenue from this forced payment of taxes will be largely in excess of the expenditure and thousands of dollars have already been paid into the county treasury that would never have found its way there but for the absolute sale.
