WILL ISSUE BONDS. Board of Education Will Issue Bonds to Make Needed Improvements.

An adjourned meeting of the board of education was held last Saturday evening. The finance committee reported that they had called on the auditor who estimated that the board would have \$30,000 from taxes at the June settlement. That expense to be met until then would aggregate \$22,000, leaving \$8,000 available to assist in making improvements. The matter was then discussed at considerable length, most of the board favoring the idea that it would not be advisable to ask the people to vote bonds to the extent at first proposed, but that it would be better to ask them for authority to get what could be gotten from the state \$10,000 or \$15,000 and then use the balance on hand from taxes. By changing the plans somewhat as to finishing the new building this amount would suffice to pay for the same. A motion to that effect was finally carried, and the special building committee was instructed to present a resolution at the regular meeting next Monday calling a meeting of the district to authorize the board to make the loan from the state. The subject of the board will meet with the approval of the people.
