## NEW CANDIDATE FOR MAYOR.

R. F. Walters in the Field for the Republican Mayoralty Nomination.

A. J. Halsted, of the Tribune, will not have clear sailing for the republican nomination for mayor, as was supposed at first, as a new candidate for the position has appeared in the person of R. F. Walters. Mr. Walters' candidacy is championed by the anti-saloon league, and the church people generally, who are said to be hustling to secure delegates favorable to their candidate in the primaries. They are said to be well organized, and will contest every ward in the city.

Mr. Walters said to the Dispatch that he was not a candidate in the sense that he was hustling for the position. He had been asked some time ago to become a candidate, and had consented to make the run if given the republican nomination and not otherwise, as he was a republican, and did not desire to oppose Mr. Halsted if he was the nominee. That he was not a politician, and knew nothing of politics, but if the people desired his candidacy enough to get him the nomination he would run.

Mr. Walters, however, expressed doubt that the nomination could be secured, as he and his friends were unfamiliar with practical politics.

**FERRIS AND SMITH THE NOMINEES.**  
The Republicans of the 48th Senatorial District Nominate Two Crow Wing County Men for Representatives.

Resolutions Instructing The Nominees To Vote and Work for the Election of Hon. Knute Nelson To the U. S. Senate Adopted.

The republican legislative convention for the 48th district was held at Little Falls on Saturday last. The convention met at the court house and was called to order at 10 o'clock by the chairman of the committee, Senator Buckman who was elected chairman and W. M. Fuller secretary. Mr. Buckman, in a five minutes speech, assured the delegates present that the results this fall would show that harmony prevailed in Morrison county, and that it was solely in the republican column.

The committee on credentials reported the following gentlemen entitled to seats in the convention: Morrison—C. B. Buckman, W. M. Fuller, I. W. Bouck, M. M. Williams, Joe Leigh, C. H. Hodge, I. B. Misfeldt, J. N. Caroes, N. Sumos, W. A. Bushay.

Crow Wing—John T. Frater, John E. Berg, N. H. Ingersoll, J. J. Howe, John Parsons, J. C. Davis, John Larson, J. C. Hessel, A. J. Halsted.

The temporary organization was then made permanent. John T. Frater, as chairman of the committee on resolutions, presented the following which was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Republicans of the 48th legislative district in delegate convention assembled, hereby affirm their allegiance to the principles of the party as enunciated in the platforms of the national and state conventions of the party, and pledge the best endeavors of the party organizations in the district for the election of the entire ticket national, congressional, state and legislative, and this convention believing that faithful service to country entitles a representative to continued confidence and support, we hereby instruct the nominees of this convention to vote and work for the reelection of Hon. Knute Nelson to the senate of the United States.

HON. A. F. Ferris and Joel Smith, of this city, were then placed in nomination for representatives from this district, and in accepting the honor both gentlemen responded in appropriate speeches, pledging their untiring efforts for the best interests of the district and the state at large.

The chair, in accord with a motion made to that effect, appointed the following legislative committee: N. H. Ingersoll, chairman; A. J. Halsted, John Larson, M. M. Williams and Jerome Meekasser. The convention then adjourned.
