That our usually quiet and orderly town
of late underwent a convulsion, or con-
vulsion of excitement, no one who has
been here can deny. The eyes of the whole
country have been attracted hither, and the
press far and near has let off its scolding
columns with "The Latest from Brainerd!"
There has been columns upon columns
written, and a few heads of, and a
thousand and one unheard of things recorded
from our town, which will pass down to pos-
terity, and eventually, we presume, be taken
as historical facts. The reporters from St.
Paul, in particular, seem to have taken the
opportunity presented by the recent "boom"
from Indian sources, as the occasion for
giving vent to their pens up towards far ex-
citing news, blooded and carna-
ge, and some of them have apparently thrown
themselves into the ring, and about to do
the world their entire culture. They will doubt-
less undergo now a stage of nervous pres-
sion, and for a time the Metropolitan jour-
nals will be dry, and "barren of anything
really surprising and of any interest."
Of late, if a man "stuffed his
nose" in Brainerd, the fact was duly "spe-
cied," and by the time the electric shock
reached St. Paul the writer, in his artful
and flash-headed columns appeared in the
dailies, announcing that John Smith got
drunk, fell against another man, whereupon
he fell on his head, and was killed. The
sides, following which a riot ensued, sev-
eral men killed many wounded, a few of the
leaders hung, and-and-yes, Brainerd was
ruled by the Iron wanted glory.

The description incident in the
Press about Brainerd, her gay saloons, dance
houses and gambling places, was an "imagi-
nary picture, most extravagantly colored,
and wholly untrue, and a most un-
pleasant and uninteresting account, that we
tried, most of us, to read, and we did not
find it so surprising in sin, shame, glee,
silly, and "awful enterprise," as we
searcely could believe our senses. There

prosperous town, and we are glad to see
them so completely and law-abidingly
disposed of by the press.

an empty shell. The Israelites ar-
rived here Friday last Thursday, followed
by a corporate guard. We understand that
the soldiers returned to Jamestown to
look up some stragglers who had given them
the slip.

Capt. Hawley proceeded to the Missouri
River to look up some counterfeiter who
have been practicing their little game both
in that region and at Jamestown. We hope
he will be successful, and do not doubt but
he will, as the Captain generally accom-
plishes what he undertakes. [Red River
Star of July 27th.]

COOK FAMILY FUNERAL.

Memorial services were held at Audubon
last Sunday afternoon, in commemoration
of the massacre of the Cook family. "All
the neighboring townships were represented,
including a large delegation from Detroit.
The services were held in the depot, and not
less than two hundred people were present,
who gave close attention to the services,
which consisted of singing, reading of the
scriptures, and prayer by Elder John E.
Wood, of Detroit.

The speaker paid a fitting tribute to the
slaughtered family, and drew from the in-
cidents of the murder the lesson it teaches
the living. It was an able and eloquent ef-
fort, appropriate to the occasion, and the
speaker held the close attention of the large
audience to his close, bringing tears from
the eyes of many who were not accustomed

RAPIDLY IMPROVING.
John Neely, who had both legs broken by an accident on the road a few weeks ago, and Mr. H. Cunningham, who had his foot crushed about the same time in a furm barn, are both, we are highly gratified to learn, improving very rapidly, under the care of the Drs. Thayer. They expect to be about again, ere many more weeks, and upon the cheering prospects of so rapid a recovery we congratulate them, and wish them better luck in the future.

FATAL ACCIDENT.
On Tuesday evening last a train coming in from the west ran over a square a few miles out from here, belonging to the Gull Lake band of Chippewas. She was lying on the track directly across the rail, as we understand, and was supposed to be steeped with whiskey, and laid down to sleep—her last sleep—on the track. Her body was severed in two, killing her instantly. She was not discovered in time to save her, by the engineer. This is the first accident of the kind we ever heard of among the Indians, and was doubtless as "new" to them as it was sad. A coffin was sent out on Wednesday in which to bury her remains.

RECOVERING.
The man who was stabbed in the melee at the Hotel Svea on Saturday evening last, is, we are glad to record, in a fair way to recover, although his wounds were severe and quite dangerous. The one who was shot is also doing well, and will soon be as good as new. We hope no more such misfortunes as that of Saturday night will befall our community in future, and in the time to come, for the love of humanity, "LET US HAVE PEACE."

THE NEW DEPOTS.
