THE NORTHERN PACIFIC.
CHANGE OF PRESIDENTS—REASONS FOR
GOVERNOR SMITH'S WITHDRAWAL.
From the New York Evening Post.
The frequent rumors of the resig-
nation by John Gregory Smith of the
Presidency of the Northern Pacific
Railroad have at last been confirmed
by the action of that corporation's
board of directors. Mr. Smith's resi-
gnment from the office was induced
partly by the condition of his health,
principally by the demand upon all
his time made by the Vermont Central
Railroad combination, of which he is
the head. The directors of the
Northern Pacific have accepted the
resignation of Mr. Smith, and elected
as his successor Geo. W. Cass, dis-
tinguished in American railroad enter-
prises, and recently the President of
the Pittsburg, Fort Wayne, and Chi-
cago line. Mr. Cass will take up his
residence permanently in New York,
and give his entire time and undivided
attention to the Northern Pacific. His
name will be public assurance of a
wise and successful management of
the great enterprise, he has been chosen
to succeed Mr. Smith.

From the Philadelphia Equiper
Mr. Smith having compelled John
Gregory Smith, Esq., to retire from
the Presidency of the Northern Pacific
Railroad, the directors of that great
and thriving enterprise, who have chosen
in his stead Geo. W. Cass, A wiser
choice than this could not have been
made. Mr. Cass having deservedly
achieved an enviable reputation as an
administrator of various railroad cor-
porations, while performing the arduous
duties of President of the Pittsburg,
Fort Wayne and Chicago road. The
new head of the Northern Pacific is,
therefore, a gentleman of ripe experi-
ence in railroad matters, keenly alive
to all the needs of the road, and fully
aware of the advantages which must
accrue to the Northwest from the ear-
ly completion of the Northern Pa-
cific from Philadelphia to the shores
of the Pacific Ocean.

The route of the N. P. R. R. has been
changed, leaving Edwinton three miles to
the north, and will cross the Missouri near
the mouth of the Little River, thence along
the valley of the latter stream. A new
town has been located east of the Plate,
2 1/2 miles from the river. Its name will
be Darlington, after the contractor who
has secured the first claim and now Ed-
winton will "fold its tents like the Arabs,"
&c., &c.
