 Mr. Smith assured them that he had no desire to have them quit, but that they would not be justified by the Brotherhood in demanding his dismissal on any pretext whatever. The Brotherhood do not undertake to dictate to the railroad companies who they shall employ.
 All the action taken by Division 86 in regard to Chapin was their individual act, and the railroad companies are not responsible for the action they have taken.
 The following rules will show the only way that any Division can justify itself through their organization in presenting any demand to railroad companies.
RULES RELATIVE TO STRIKES.
 No Sub-Division of the B. of L. E. is allowed to present any demand to the officers of the road where they are employed until they shall first notify the Grand Chief Engineer of all the facts in detail. Then, if it is determined that the matter is of a serious nature, a detailed statement of the trouble and details of the case shall be submitted to all the Sub-Divisions of the Division, and a majority of them shall be required to sustain the demand, which shall be notified to the officers of the company, and be entitled to their full consideration of the whole organization.
 The above rules were amended at the St. Louis Convention, and the officers of a Sub-Division, requiring their suspension if they engage in a strike without the sanction of the Division, and all members that are in any way implicated in such a strike shall be suspended.
 In case the above rules are not complied with, it becomes the duty of the Grand Chief Engineer of the Division, and all members that are in any way implicated in such a strike shall be suspended.
 When the Annual Convention meets the Grand Chief Engineer shall be notified, and if suspended, the suspension will be made perpetual.
 It is the duty of every member of a Sub-Division to notify the Grand Chief Engineer of the Division of any trouble that may befall the Sub-Division, and to cooperate with the officers of the Division in their efforts to prevent any further interruption to the service, and to support the action of the Division, and to assume the entire responsibility of any future interruption to the service.

The Strike.
 The following is an account of the late trouble on the St. Louis, Kansas City & Northern Road:
 On the 27th day of February, 1873, the members of the Moberly Division No. 86, of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, sent a note to Mr. Smith, the General Superintendent of the road, asking to remove the Division 86 to their own territory, or to have their Division 86 to be merged with the Division of Missouri.
 In our opinion, the officers of the company manifest a disposition of retaining the Division 86 as a settlement upon the basis of an agreement mutually agreed upon Sunday, Saturday, was caused by the fact that the Division 86, or the Division, latter has been organized, and the matter has been fully explained to the official that the threat made by the committee before the officers, was unauthorized, and that the person who made the same has been removed from the committee.
