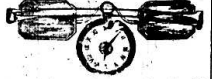

## The Attorney-Gen'sship.

Although, to a casual observer, it may seem premature to refer to individual candidates for any of the various offices to be filled next fall, yet in view of circumstances likely to occur in the near future, touching, or having a bearing upon our political interests next fall, we feel as though it is not too soon to speak out upon matters that might, in our opinion, shape affairs for the best to us as a party. In the present instance, having heard the name of the Hon. W. W. Blunsom, of Duluth, mentioned in connection with the office of Attorney General, we arise to "second the motion" most heartily. In the first place, Mr. Blunsom is well qualified for the place, as all who know him will agree being a good lawyer, a young man in the full mental and physical vigor of life, and a gentleman who stands as a shining example of temperance and morality—most valuable qualities in the character of a chief attorney of a State. With all due deference to the character and ability of the present incumbent, and also all the other aged officials in Minnesota, yet we feel that a rotation in office is healthful to the body politic, and also that the claims of our young men—where ability is acknowledged—should be favored. Mr. Blunsom, if elected, carries with him, in a strong degree, the right of location; he is one of the rising men of the New Northwest, which by its present importance and rapid development, can well lay claim to being honored by having one of its citizens called to a State office. He would also be a strong man on the ticket, as he is well and favorably known in the southern portion of the State and elsewhere, where he is esteemed highly by men of all parties for his moral worth and fine abilities. We feel confident that the Republican party of Minnesota will do well for itself by not overlooking the name of Mr. Blunsom in connection with the office indicated, and charge it up to the account of the New Northwest.
