Dr. Dan'l Leasure, in the Pittsburgh Leader, refers to our Northern Pacific production of wheat as follows: "The Red River forms the boundary line between the State of Minnesota and the Territory of Dakota, and before leaving the State to enter the Territory I will just refer to the statements of farmers in relation to the number of bushels of wheat that have been produced to the acre of soil.

The names of the killed are Dennis Maluku, fireman, and Aug. Johnson, engineer. Some of the injured are not expected to recover. The engine-house and machine shop were large brick buildings, but recently built. The boiler was also new. The loss on machinery, it is supposed, will exceed \$20,000. Total loss, however, will be heavy.

Progress of the Northern Pacific.

In little more than twenty-four months of working time, the Northern Pacific Railroad Company has accomplished the following results:

1. It has built and opened to business more than 500 miles of its line of Road, besides an additional section of one hundred miles put under contract and now being constructed.

2.
