Indianapolis, Ind., March 2.-A large meeting of business men and manufacturers was held at Masonic Hall to-night, to express their views on the currency question. J. D. Kingan, of the firm of Kingan & Co., the largest pork packing establishment in the United States, was chosen president, with ten vice presidents, representing all the leading business and manufacturing interests of this city. The following resolutions were March 2, at about six o'clock this ananimously adopted:

Statistics of the Crops.

The National Crop Reporter publishes esti-mates is relation to the percentage of the hay and polatoe crops of 1873 in producers hands on February 1st, in the States of Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Minnesota, Ohio and Wis-consin. The following is an extract of the main features presented : The States named preduced last year over 9,000,000 tons of hay, of which there was on hand February 1st a little over 48,per cent., or about 4,500,000 tons. Illinois retains the lightest percentage, a trifle

nearly 52 per cent.

The average price of wheat and potatoes in some of the states, relatively considered, are somewhat anomalous. In Illinois, potatoes average five cents per bushel higher than wheat; in lowa seven cents higher, and in

Kansas ten cents higher.
