THE NEWS.

**Festivals.**  
The proprietors of a minstrel performance at Montgomery, Alabama, having refused to accept admission to the parquette of a theater, they were arrested on complaint of the negroes for violation of the civil rights bill. The proprietors gave bonds for their appearance to stand trial.

A fire at Port au Prince burned over a half the square, destroying \$500,000 worth of property. An American merchant was turned to death.

A new party has been formed in Ohio, based upon the abrogation of National Banks, and the issue of unlimited greenbacks direct to the people. It is proposed to carry this issue into the next Presidential contest.

The Southern States were visited by heavy rains during the first part of March, causing damaging floods in many localities.

The New Hampshire election resulted in a small Republican majority in the legislature, and the election of two Democrats and one Republican Congressman.

The various departments at Washington, have issued circulars announcing the abolition of the Civil Service rules and abolishing the sub-board of examination. Each department will hereafter make its own rules.

Among the western appointments confirmed by the Senate on the 10th, were J. F. Bryan, Pension Agent at La Crosse, Charles Seymour, postmaster at the same place; W. T. Maxwell, Creco, and J. J. Mathews, Lyons, Iowa, postmasters.

The case of Finchback was last postponed by the U. S. Senate until December next, by a vote of 30 to 33.

**Crimes and Casualties.**  
There were two hangings in Maryland on the 19th inst. One, that of Joshua Griffin, colored, at Belair, for the murder of Miss Susan Taylor, near Aberdeen, on the 12th of October, 1874. The other, Geo. Wheeler, also colored, for the murder of Mrs. Margaret Wiltman, a white woman, in July last.

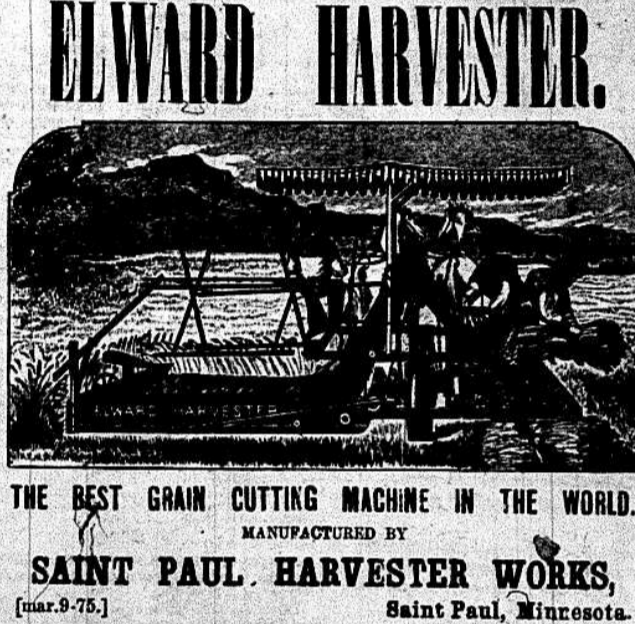
