THE NEWS.

Crimes. The suit of Miss Alice Barry against the Chicago Times for libel has resulted in a verdict against the publisher for \$25,000.

W. P. Wilson, formerly of St. Paul, committed suicide at Fort Gary, recently. Cause: financial embarrassment.

Another raid into Texas by the Mexican robbers is reported from Brownsville. United States troops have been sent after them, and it is expected that the gang will be captured.

A rough known as Black River Bill, who is well known in many towns in the Northwest, has been arrested in Canada for robbing a hotel.

A detachment of cavalry, under Lieutenant Austin Hensley, of the 6th cavalry, surrounded a party of 37 hostile Indians, in Kansas, last Sunday.

Advices from Kansas state that a large land of Osage Indians are now on the war path, and will probably be heard from in the Eastern States.

A suburb of Bismarck, called Pleasant Point, was swept away by the flood, recently. No lives lost.

Mr. Donaldson, the balloonist, made a trip in his air car from Philadelphia, the other day and alighted near Jackson, N. J.

Reports from Indiana, Ohio, and portions of Pennsylvania report the damage to fruits and winter wheat by the recent frosts to be far greater than first reported.

The Union Pacific railway is in a bad fix. It is reported that the track is washed out in many places—some breaking two hundred miles.

A frightful calamity occurred at New Orleans, on Friday, March 24. Three steamers lying at the levee took fire and were burned to the water's edge.

Reports of the condition of the growing crop, in the Northwest, made on March 24th, are not encouraging.

Disasterous fires in St. Louis and Chicago last week took \$200,000 from the insurance companies.

A dispatch from Omaha dated April 26, says the water in the Missouri is the highest known for years.

The cross-examination of Mr. Beecher closed on the 21st.

A dispatch from Bismarck says the Black Hills fever at that place is subsiding.

United States troops have been tendered to the Governor of Texas to aid in repelling robbers' raids from Mexico.

WADENA AFFAIRS

We clip the following from the Wadena and the Park News:

Our correspondent to your paper was married a few weeks ago, and since that time has been able only to attend to family affairs.

Well, well, Stuart, it's kind of nice for you to "acknowledge the corn," even after the lapse of a few weeks, and the cigars will be just as acceptable now as any time.

We were sorry to learn that a young man by the name of Jack Sanford, a resident of Deer Creek, had the misfortune to break his leg while working on the drive for Scott and Howard.

Two sample men—i. e. men with samples of St. Paul goods—were in town on Tuesday.

A. N. Peach, successor of the firm of A. N. Peach & Bro., of this place, made an assignment to C. E. Boetwick, of Duluth, for the benefit of his creditors, on the 22d inst.

It is estimated that 2,000 acres or more of grain will be sown in the immediate vicinity of Wadena this season. Not bad for a county only two years old.

We are glad to know that our good landlady of the Wadena Hotel, Mrs. Potter, has quite recovered from her recent severe illness, and is up and around once again.

Mr. Wm. Heatherington, from Liverpool, arrived in town on Monday. He made the trip in fourteen days. He has come over to see his English friends, with a view, as we are informed, of making Minnesota his home.

Our sportsmen here are just going for the ducks. No "decoys" in their hands.

Mr. Davis, of your city, took a few minutes' snuff of our Wadena atmosphere on Wednesday. We see he is abundantly able to cast a shadow.

THE NORTHERN PACIFIC.

The work of the recent meeting of directors of the Northern Pacific Railroad Company, at which General Cass's resignation as president was presented and accepted, consisted principally of an investigation of the liabilities and assets as furnished by the Company's report.

By these it appears that the assets consist of 550 miles of finished road and over 10,000,000 acres of land, while the liabilities are mortgaged bonds to the amount of \$30,000,000, stock to the amount of \$25,000,000, which was distributed as a premium to the bonds, and a floating debt of less than \$700,000, of which \$500,000 is due to the directors of the road.

Besides this, there is \$2,500,000 of back interest due, which is unclassified and which will probably be relinquished by the bondholders in their settlement of the present difficulty. After the examination of their report, the committee discussed with the company's officers the financial difficulties of the road, and the best way out of them. Three plans were prominent among the many proposed.

First, to form an association of bondholders that might be strong enough to foreclose the mortgage and buy in the road; second, for the bondholders to exchange their bonds for preferred stock, leaving the completed road clear of debt as the basis of a new series of loans, and then later to effect a second exchange of bonds for the stock if desired; third, to hold the road built and lands earned as sole security for the bonds now out, to divide the road to be constructed into sections of twenty-five miles, and to make an issue of bonds for each section, to be secured by that particular section, and the lands earned through it. No decisive action has as yet been taken.

"Resolved, That the ordinance requiring all places of business to be kept shut on Sunday, be re-published in the Brainerd Tribune."

ORDINANCE NO. 14.

An ordinance to compel all places of business to be shut on Sundays.

The Common Council of the City of Brainerd do enact as follows:

Sec. 1.—No person or persons shall open his shop, store, warehouse or saloon for the transaction of business, within the limits of the City of Brainerd, on the Lord's Day, commonly called Sunday.

Sec. 2.—The Police of this city are hereby instructed to see that the provisions of this ordinance are carried into effect.

Sec. 3.—Any person or persons convicted of a violation of the provisions of this ordinance, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars, nor less than twenty-five dollars.
