The American Medical Association is in session at Louisville, Ky. The United States District Court of Texas says, in a review of the civil rights bill, that all persons have a right to board an inn or enter a theatre or public hall.

Municipal elections in Indiana generally resulted favorably to the democrats. The Massachusetts ultra temperance men denounce the liquor law now in force in that State as a disaster and a disgrace.

The resignation of U. S. Attorney General Williams has been formally accepted by the president, and Judge Edward Pierpont appointed to fill the vacancy.

The Chinese government is about to send a portion of the royal navy on a cruise around the world.

Rev. Edward Eggleston Will Now Preach. The Church of Christian Endeavor, the "Church without a Cross," is giving pastor delight to call it at Lee Mans and Howe street, Brooklyn, was crowded yesterday morning at the installation of the Rev. Edward Eggleston.

The services were begun with an organ voluntary, during the performance of which the Rev. Prof. David Swing and Rev. Edward Eggleston, D. D. took their seats on the platform.

Dr. Eggleston: This people have extended to you a unanimous call to the pastorate of this church, and all have been accepted by you, it is my pleasing duty as an officer of the church and society to welcome you to this pulpit and to our love, our confidence and our sympathy.

The Rev. Dr. Eggleston, as he took Mr. Wilde's hand, said in substance that it gave him great pleasure in extending the right hand of fellowship to one who had been so faithful to the Church in the hour of its necessity.

The city of Oskosh, Wis., was visited by a disastrous conflagration, on the 26th ult., from which it is long in recovering. A Chicago newspaper gives the following account of it: "The fire, for a time, fought bravely in the face of terrible odds, to stay the progress of the flames, but was driven back step by step.

Three men were reported killed by falling walls, but their names could not be ascertained. The fire was the most destructive in the history of the city, and over one hundred families were made homeless.

The loss is variously estimated. The most conservative estimate is \$750,000, and the highest is \$2,000,000. The city is in the utmost confusion.

A Young Man Murders His Grandmother, the Girl who Rejected His Love, and Her Mother, and Then Commits Suicide. (Cuba N. Y. Correspondence N. Y. Herald.)

On Wednesday evening, this place was thrown into great excitement by a man from New Hudson dashing into town on horseback after a doctor, and announcing that James Lafferty, a somewhat notorious character in this part of the county, had murdered his grandmother, an aged lady with whom he lived, shot the wife and daughter of a farmer named George Vannoy, and then killed himself.

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Lafferty came to the house in the afternoon, and Mrs. Vannoy was in the kitchen. Lafferty entered the room and commenced talking with the young lady. He had formerly worked for her father, and had for a year professed to be in love with her and wanted her to marry him.
