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The war is over and peace declared between the Duluth Tribune and the "ging," which confirms the old prophecy, "wonders will never cease." Yet Bro. Mitchell appears rather dubious of the good faith of his antagonists, and while he cordially receives their acknowledgments and promises he remains perfectly non-committal, waiting for actions which speak louder than words to decide their integrity in the matter.  
The Minneapolis dailies are dancing to libel music to the tune of one-eighth of a million dollars. In fact libel is getting to be their regular diet, so that scarcely an article is written now for either paper except with a view to its libelous effect, and we presume, nothing of a personal nature is permitted to enter their columns until it has been submitted to and approved by eminent legal counsel. That certainly would be a creditable type of independent journalism, and is just as certainly what we are drifting to if such proceedings as those instituted against these papers, or the Pine City verdict against the Pioneer-Press, are tolerated in law for a single instant. Such a law would disgrace a statute book in barbarism.

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**The Russell-Ornduff Case.**  
A communication in the Pioneer-Press of the 9th inst. touching the election of Coroner of Ramsey county, evokes two points that will arise in the Russell-Ornduff case in this county, if it reaches a contest. First, the correspondents who lays claim to some legal knowledge, after quoting Section 104 of Chapter one of General Statutes, providing that "The ballot shall be a paper ticket containing, written or printed, or partly written and partly printed, the names of the persons for whom the elector intends to vote," says, "I do not see, by a proper construction of the statute, how the county canvassers can give to him (P. H. Gabrielson) the vote cast for H. P. Gabrielson—an entirely different person in the eye of the law. The same question arose in a recent election in New Hampshire, where ballots printed, 'Nathaniel Head' were not accredited to 'Nathaniel Head.' Consequently Nathaniel Head lost his election."  
Now it is claimed that some of the tickets in the First Ward were written for auditor, "Kirk," others "Coykon" and "Coykend," and were all accredited to H. G. Coykendall; consequently, if the rule laid down by this correspondent is good law, those votes would be thrown out entirely.  
Second, in providing the remedy, he says: "Most of the district canvassers (judges of election) paid no attention to the initials of one of the candidates for coroner, and placed the sum total in a lump to P. H. or H. P. Gabrielson. This can be remedied by the county board re-counting the ballots, or sending them back to the respective local boards to do it." Now that sounds reasonable. It appears to be a very rigid law that would compel a candidate to abide the returns of the judges of election without any regard to the manner in which they done their duty, that their most flagrant infraction and arbitrary caprice could only be reached through the channel of a legal contest, as is held to be the law by authorities here. Suppose, for instance, they should, from any cause, neglect or refuse to make any return at all upon a certain office, as they did in the Second Ward, on Chief Justice and the Constitutional Amendments, to say that those returns could not be legally sent back to them for correction, and that the ballots have to be returned to the auditor and by him locked up in his holy of holies, where not even the "priest" himself is to be permitted to look at them, seems to say the very least, to be too absurd to be reasonable. We venture the opinion that a mandamus could compel those judges to re-count the votes and correct their returns.

**Odd Fellows Funeral—Burial of Richard Grandon.**  
(As will be seen from the following taken from the Omaha (Neb.) Press of the 10th inst. the remains of Richard Grandon, deceased, who was a member of Whiskey Lodge, I. O. F. No. 27, of Brainerd, reached his friends and relatives in that city in safety, and were there consigned in due form to their last resting place in accordance with the plans of his brethren here, in a manner highly gratifying and satisfactory to this Lodge.—Ed.)  
Yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock the Odd Fellows of this city consigned the remains of the late Richard Grandon to their last sad resting place, the ceremony being of a most imposing and solemn character.  
The deceased was formerly a citizen of this place. He was a brother-in-law to Mrs. Mary Grandon, and he has a brother in Texas and one in Utah.  
He was about 30 years of age, and was a locomotive fireman by occupation. He was killed July 27, 1875, by the falling of a train through the railroad bridge across the Mississippi river at Brainerd, Minnesota, in which accident several were killed and drowned.  
When Grandon was found he was not quite dead, being conscious long enough to request that he should be buried at Omaha, among his friends in the Catholic cemetery, which request was refused, as he was a member of the order of Odd Fellows, a secret society.  
At his death-bed he was surrounded by Odd Fellows, who did all in their power to alleviate his sufferings, until they were ended by death. His remains were placed in a metallic casket, and arrived here last week.  
The funeral yesterday took place from the undertaking rooms of Coroner Gish, the Rev. Leroy F. Britt officiating.  
The Union Pacific band headed the long procession; then came the members of the several lodges in regalia, followed by the hearse and a large concourse of sorrowing friends and brothers in carriages. The line proceeded to prospect Hill cemetery, where were deposited the remains of the deceased, who was known as honest Dick Grandon among his acquaintances.
