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1776 CENTENNIAL 1876 Republican Ticket. For President, GOV. RUTHERFORD B. HAYES, Of Ohio. For Vice-President, HON. WILLIAM A. WHEELER, Of New York. PRESIDENTIAL ELECTORS, C. K. DAVIS, A. K. FINNEY, STEPHEN MILLER, HANS MATTHEW, A. J. EDGERTON. SECRETARY BRISTOW RESIGNED. One of the most villainous acts of President Grant's administration was perpetrated nearly two weeks ago, but only recently made public, resulting in the prompt withdrawal from his cabinet of the most honorable, able and highly respected of its members, Col. B. H. Bristow, Secretary of the Treasury. It appears that one Booth, the collector of customs at Baltimore and an ardent Conkling man had removed four of the inspectors under him because they were Blaine men and supported him in the Maryland Convention. When advised of this Mr. Bristow ordered them re-instated, which Booth refused to do, and appealed to President Grant, who at once directed Martin, Bristow's appointing clerk, to write Booth approving his action. Learning that his authority had thus been openly and flagrantly overruled and trampled under foot by his superior through a subordinate, Bristow at once took the only honorable alternative—removed Martin and sent his resignation to the President, which was as promptly accepted. This is only another demonstration of the fact, notorious for the past six or seven years, that President Grant has no feelings or sense in sympathy with or partaking in the least particular of truth, purity or honesty—that he is totally ignorant of their meaning or import, or of any thing else except bull-headed, tyrannical obstinacy, and that in direct contravention to the interests and wishes of his constituents, upon whom he only looks as privates in his command, menials having no rights whatever that he is bound to respect, not even elevating them to the standard of subjects. There is one feature in this connection, however, that affords rare consolation, and that is the fact that next March (if a kind Providence does not sooner effect it) will relieve this country of this curse.

HAYES is 54 years old, Wheeler, 57. THE Dispatch is exceedingly jubilant over the nomination of Gov. Hayes at Cincinnati, because it fulfills the first of its "three predictions;" it will advocate the nomination of Gov. Tilden at St. Louis, because that would fulfill the second, in which it will doubtless succeed; but it would be hard on Hall if the third should prove a failure.

MA. BLAINE'S railroad record may now go into the waste basket.—[St. Louis Times. That one little sentence tells the whole story of the Blaine investigations. The purpose of the Confederates was simply to smirch a possible republican presidential nominee, and when Mr. Blaine's nomination ceased to be a possibility, the mud-batteries were silenced.—[Pioneer Press. It seems to be quite difficult for many of our contemporaries to fall so suddenly into line in the Hayes and Wheeler campaign, from the "Blaine and don't care who" leadership, and numerous bulls result from their first attempt. The Lake City Leader calls Hayes, Richard B.; the Duluth Minnesotan-Herald is for William E. Wheeler, and the shout of all is "Hurrah for Blaine, Hayes—and—and—Wheeler."

THE Pioneer Press and Tribune says, "The sober second thought of the people will be that Providence was wiser than their wishes, and that under all the circumstances, Hayes will prove a more fortunate choice than Blaine would have been."

WE fail to see that Providence had any thing to do with it. A set of wily politicians bent upon "any thing to beat Blaine," and coming very short of possessing any of the attributes of a Providence, settled that matter.

THE Dispatch confident of Democratic Defeat. Mr. Donnelly, in the Anti-Monopolist, advises the Democrats to "repeat the Allen-Hayes contest of last year in the national field. What's the use of subjecting Mr. Allen to another defeat? The old man has deserved too well of his countrymen to be thus abused in his old age.—[St. Paul Dispatch.

IS it possible the Democrats have so far abandoned the contest as to withhold their best and tried men from the field for the avowed purpose of saving them the dishonor of defeat? We hasten to inform them that defeat at the hands of Governor Hayes will be no dishonor.

THE trunk roads east of Chicago, excepting the Grand Trunk, have made another reduction in passenger rates to the following figures: Chicago to New York, \$13; to Boston, \$14.

LATER—The Grand Trunk rates from Chicago to Boston, via Montreal, are \$12, and the ticket agent has orders to keep the rate \$2 below the other trunk lines.

THE Supreme Court of the State has rendered a decision that the sale of a sewing machine by a company to an individual, the buyer stipulating to pay for the same in instalments, constitutes a bona fide sale, and a failure to pay these instalments does not render the purchaser liable to the loss of whatever sums he may have paid on the same. Under this decision a machine thus sold cannot be seized by a company, on the ground that the sale partook of the nature of a lease.

ONE reason why we pay six per cent. for our money abroad is, that we have fallen into the habit of universal slander, and more especially the passion of the Democracy to vilify the government. By so doing, as a people, we degrade ourselves, defame our country, trifle with our credit, call upon the world to see what knaves and rascals we are, and then marvel that the world should take us at our word, and charge us more for money than nations without half our resources. We shall strengthen our credit when we strengthen our self-respect.—[Duluth Herald.

THE Republican Congressional Convention of the third District has been called to meet at Music Hall, in St. Paul, on Wednesday, July 19th, 1876, at 12 o'clock, p. m., and being the only member of the Crow Wing committee residing in the county, we have decided to call our Republican voters to meet on Monday, July 18th, at 8 o'clock, sharp, to elect one delegate to attend the District Convention. Republicans will please govern themselves accordingly.

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THE years ago Mr. Blaine called Mr. Conkling a "turkey gobble," and that is believed to be the reason why Conkling threw his strength for Hayes, in the convention, against Blaine.

"It's no use for Liberty Hall to try. No one wearing that name can be elected to congress in Minnesota.—[St. Paul Dispatch.

IS the same Hall growing in diameter with the Dispatch? Don't hate yourself too bad just yet, Bro. Hall, wait till November. THE Minneapolis Trade Index is changed to the State Index and Minneapolis News-Letter, and is enlarged to an eight-page paper. As long names appear to be popular just now, we are thinking of getting Rowell's Newspaper Directory for 1876 stereotyped for a heading for the Tribune.

A New Paper at Little Falls. We received a call this week from J. D. Lachance, auditor of Morrison county, the object of the warfare of the Little Falls Courier, and A. J. Clarke, of Detroit, formerly of the Detroit Record, the Fargo Express, and the Becker Co. Banner. We understand that arrangements have been perfected under which Mr. Clarke is to start a paper at Little Falls for the reason that the Courier has become so persistent, unyielding, and unreasonable in its attacks upon Mr. Lachance, which, so far as we can learn, are groundless, that he can no longer tolerate it and transfer the county printing business with that paper, and has promised Clarke all the patronage under his control.

HARD ON THE Soft Money Organ. The letting of the publication of the delinquent tax list of Ramsey county at St. Paul this week effected rather a back-handed compliment to Bro. Donnelly's paper, the Anti-Monopolist. The only bids received were from Donnelly, at 8 cents, and Hall, of the Dispatch, at 15 cents. The discussion that followed the opening of the bids was said to be amusing to Donnelly especially. Some of the commissioners had never heard of such a paper as the Anti-Monopolist. One of them wanted to know if it was published in St. Paul; if so, how long had it been in existence. Another had seen one copy, and another had had a specimen copy sent him once; but no one else knew how it looked—its size, shape or color. The law was referred to, which requires the paper publishing the list to be one of "general circulation," and it was unanimously decided that the Anti-Monopolist was not a paper of general circulation in St. Paul or Ramsey county, and the contract was awarded the Dispatch, without opposition.

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ADVERTISING is the fuel that keeps the business pot-bolling. THE Democratic National Convention meets at St. Louis on Wednesday next, 28th inst. READ the platform and proceedings of the Republican National Convention at Cincinnati on our second page.

LAURENCE, the convicted murderer of Mrs. Lick in St. Paul last summer, was sentenced on Monday to be hanged after three months solitary confinement in Ramsey county jail.

BRO. ROWELL, of the Lake City Leader, writes us that he and his partner, Mr. Jones, will start for Philadelphia to visit the Centennial on July 6th. We rather think we would prefer a trip later in the season, when the weather will be cooler.

HEBRY DOUGLASS, a colored porter on a sleeping car on the L. S. & M. road attempted the murder of George Eastwood, a brakeman on the same train, while en route from Duluth to St. Paul, striking him over the head with an iron poker and afterwards stabbing him with a knife seven times. The cause was an old grudge. Douglass was arrested and taken to Stillwater for examination. Eastwood is thought will recover, though it is by no means certain.

WE have looked in vain for several weeks for a communication in the Gleaner Register from a young man who called upon us for a copy of the Tribune, some paper, pen and ink, stating that he was writing up the town for the Register, and occupied a large portion of the forenoon, a part of the afternoon and our sanctum during the time, billing several sheets of foolscap (no application intended) on both sides and crossways, which he enclosed and addressed to Hon. Liberty Hall, Gleaner, Minn., but Hall has "suppressed it." Remember Proctor Knott, and let us have it, Bro. Hall, our town can stand it if you can.

SOME of the figures of the last census relating to illiteracy in various states and sections, are calculated to take the conceit out of New England that illiteracy is confined to the west and south. It appears by a table recently published that in the New England states the ratio of illiteracy, which means persons over ten years who can neither read nor write, to the total population is one to twenty-four; in the western states as one to thirty. The school attendance in New England at that time was 733,179; in the Western states, 2,598,381, or one to 4-3-4 in New England to 1-1-4 in the Western states.

EX-SHERIFF E. L. WIARD, of Carlton county, was brought down here yesterday by Dept. U. S. Marshall Geo. S. Huse, on the charge as we are informed of having been engaged in a "conspiracy" of some sort. The alleged conspiracy consists we believe in his having recently "whaled" somebody who made, as he claims a false charge against him before the U. S. Commissioner at St. Paul. After Mr. Wiard gave the party referred to (Ethan W. Allen) the dressing down, he went before a justice of the peace and paid his fine like a little man, and he supposed that would be the end of the matter; but Dist. Atty. Wilson, it seems, don't intend to allow witnesses who testify against evil-doers, or alleged evil-doers to be hauled over the coals by the party accused; and hence, Mr. Wiard's arrest. The case is being heard to-day before Dept. U. S. Commissioner, Judge J. E. Carey, Mr. Billson appearing for the prosecution and D. G. Cash for the defense.—[Duluth Tribune.

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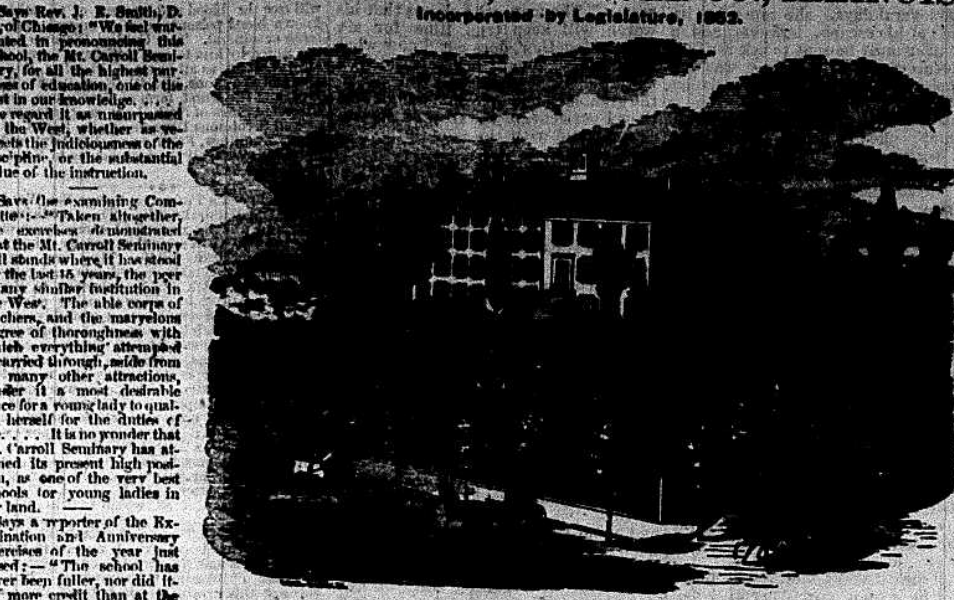
