GRAY EAGLE, the chief who fired into the steamer Far West on the Yellowstone, and was killed by the boatmen and reported scalped and quartered, while yet alive, was from Standing Rock, and was with the party of Indians who passed through here last winter en route to Washington to make a new treaty with the Government.

SERIOUS apprehensions, and perhaps not without reason, are entertained of an Indian uprising in Texas. Two or three thousand Indians have camped on the north fork of the Red River, twenty-five miles from Fort Elliot, and it is believed are making preparations to go upon the war path.

The St. Paul Dispatch of the 4th inst. contains a lengthy, senseless array of figures showing that the expenditure for public buildings by government during the last fifteen years under republican rule is greater than the expenditure for the same purpose during the seventy-one years previous thereto.

GENERAL FORESTY passed east on Tuesday's train direct from Gen. Terry's command. He reports the water too low in the Yellowstone for navigation and recommends the postponement of the building of the proposed forts on that river until spring at that season, and operations have accordingly ceased.

Perhaps the Dispatch, so profuse in statistics, can inform its readers what the petty expenditures were for public buildings during the last decade of that century?

The latest advices from Terry and Crook came by the steamer Carroll to Bismarck on the 6th inst., and report both columns still entrenched where they have been ever since Crook's repulse and the Custer massacre—about 76 miles apart—and the accounts of the depredations and maneuvers of the Indians indicate quite plainly that they have the upper hand, and are reaping all the victuals of the country, and are effectually effecting nothing. The Indians have divided into small bands and distributed themselves wherever they can find any mischief to do; they have burned the whole country over, rendering it entirely barren and consequently impassable to the troops.

The Indian Parcel. Dr. L. Butler, of Minneapolis, has put his clerks at work writing letters over the district advocating the election of McNair. This is considered the dirtiest kind of scoundrel bolting, and indicates that Mr. Butler is one of those rule or ruin men who think they are the only ones who can serve the people in public office, and that they have a just-right to be indignant about it if their superior (!) claims are not recognized.

SUMMARY OF THE NEWS.

Crimes, Criminals and Composites. Over forty fishermen perished in a gale on the coast of Great Britain, recently.

The ship Gillwood, from Liverpool to Milwaukee, was lost with all hands of Cape Horn, about 400 miles east of Astoria.

CONGRESSIONAL.

On the 1st inst. the Senate acquitted Belknap of the charges set forth in the impeachment.

THE LONG-DELAYED LETTER OF ACCEPTANCE.

The letters of Gov. Tilden and Hendricks formally accepting the nominations of the Democratic national convention are almost voluminous, exhaustively treating the main questions to be brought into the pending canvass.

Gov. Tilden, after apologizing for the delay in writing the letter which custom has made a rule, says the present depression in business and the industries has its cause in excessive governmental corruption, and is aggravated by the most unscientific methods of taxation.

Gov. Hendricks fully agrees in the principles, approves the policies and sympathizes with the purposes enunciated in the platform adopted by the St. Louis convention.
