**Hayes Elected President.**  
Desperate Measures by the Democrats.  
Ballot Box Stuffers of Florida as Ballot Box Smashers.  
A Resort to Fraud and Violence to Compass Hayes' Defeat.  
Troops Sent into the State to Checkmate the Confederates.

**The Republican National Committee Confident of Victory.**  
Hayes Himself no Longer Doubts His Election.  
Stewart Elected to Congress by 1,500 Majority.  
A Villian at Aitkin Treated to Tar and Feathers.

**THE NEWS OF THE WEEK.**  
St. Paul, Nov. 8, 9 a. m.—The returns leave little doubt that, with a Solid South, Tilden has carried New York, Indiana, Wisconsin and Connecticut, and with them, without going any farther, a majority of the electoral college. Stewart is elected to Congress.  
St. Paul, Nov. 8, 5 p. m.—The report of this morning lacks confirmation. The Republicans now claim New York, Louisiana, South Carolina, North Carolina, Wisconsin and Oregon, which, if true, elects Hayes. It is safe to say that they are at least doubtful. Stewart still stands ahead.  
Duluth, Nov. 9, 8 a. m.—Hayes is ahead one vote.  
Minneapolis, Nov. 9, 12 m.—Stewart is elected. A decision of the Presidential contest is awaiting returns from Louisiana, claimed by both parties.  
St. Paul, Nov. 9, 6 p. m.—Louisiana has gone republican, and Hayes is elected by one majority. Stewart has 1,500 majority.  
St. Paul, Nov. 10, 9 a. m.—Confusion and uncertainty again. The report that North Carolina had gone Republican is not confirmed. Latest dispatches give it to the democrats by 12,000 majority. Everything now depends on Florida, and from Florida the news is not encouraging. The Governor claims the vote of the State as surely republican, but telegraphs the democrats are resorting to violence to suppress or destroy the returns from remote points. A special train sent to bring the returns from the western counties was Ku Kluxed and thrown from the track. No effort will be spared to carry that State and Louisiana for Tilden.  
St. Paul, Nov. 10, 5 p. m.—Tilden is elected. A telegram just received from Democratic headquarters at Chicago states that all States in the South have gone for Tilden, which elects him without a doubt.  
Nov. 10, 5:30 p. m.—There is no certainty that Tilden has carried the Solid South. The returns are not all in, and it is impossible yet to tell how it will go. All reports are chiefly conjectures.  
LATELY.  
St. Paul, Nov. 11, 9 a. m.—Florida gives Hayes 8,000 majority.  
St. Paul, Nov. 11, 11 a. m.—The Pioneer-Press this a. m. reports that desperate measures of fraud and violence are being adopted in Florida by the democrats to defeat Hayes' majority in that State. The State is largely republican, but the ballot box stuffers have become

**THE WHY AND WHEREFORE.**  
Looked at simply as a proposition addressed to the average common sense of men, and to their instincts of self-preservation, to say nothing of their patriotism or their consciences, it seems amazing that voters enough could have been found in the northern states to give back the control of the government to that same Solid South which, less than a dozen years ago, was fighting with all the fiery and desperate fury of implacable hatred for its destruction; or to select to the presidency a man who was in full sympathy with them, and who represents in his political utterances and opinions the very principles of national nihilism and state sovereignty which the south fought to make good, and the north to extirpate from the government. It seems amazing that voters enough could be found even in Indiana, the slums of New York and along the Erie canal, to take the tremendous risks and the certain calamities involved in this restoration to power of the dethroned and expelled slave-power, with its hands reeking with fresh butcheries of the only defenders of the union at the south. And it is still more amazing when we ask why they voted to thus put at hazard all the results of the war and to reopen all the perilous controversies that were settled by the war and its adjustments; what they expected to gain by taking too great a risk. We search in vain for an explanation of this desperate venture in any of the ordinary rational motives which are presumed to govern the deliberate choice of intelligent men. Certainly it was not for any of the reasons for which the democratic party asked their vote; not to establish a sound currency, restore the public credit and maintain the national honor, for every body knows that all these interests are perfectly safe in the hands of the republican party, and that the only sources of danger to either of them are in the democratic party; not to hasten the resumption of specie payments for the only obstacle to resumption is the democratic party; not to change the tariff system, for the issue has not been mentioned in the campaign; not to retrench the public expenditures or to reduce the federal taxes, for this policy steadily preserved by the republican party is only likely to be set aside in order to satisfy the rapacious demands of the Solid South and the rabble of non-tax payers who constitute the bulk of the democratic party; not to purify the civil service because the accession to power of the party which fastened the spoils system on the country and is hungry with fifteen years' abstinence threatens to postpone for many years the reform in the civil service to which Hayes is pledged; not to get rid of corruption, for if the republican party has not been pure the democratic party is ten fold worse; not to get an honest and high-minded man at the head of the government, for no one questions the unimpeachable purity of Hayes and the lofty disinterestedness of his character, while recent disclosures have rendered Mr. Tilden's personal integrity more than doubtful, while his mercenary ambition and crafty selfishness are known to all.  
And for none of these reasons did a majority of the votes in New York, Connecticut, New Jersey and Indiana prefer Tilden elected and supported by a Solid South at the head of the government to a republican party administration under Hayes, for what then? The explanation is an easy one, though it is not creditable to the intelligence of these majorities. For three years past the country has been suffering from what the democratic platform calls "the paralysis of hard times;" hundreds of thousands of men have been thrown out of employment; tens of thousands of small retailers or speculators have been reduced to bankruptcy and all have felt the stringency of the times and the dullness of business.  
Experience has proved that in all these periods of industrial and financial depression—solely the result of economical causes—there is an astonishing number of fools who attribute the hard times to the government, and who actually expect that with a general change of parties the government will in some vague way remedy the evils from which they are suffering.  
The popular discontent and impatience, all forms of suffering and want, seek a blind revenge upon the party in power for evils for which the party in power is no more responsible than the grasshopper plague or the potato rot, and vote for a political revolution under a vague notion that change will be improvement. In this case every intelligent person could readily perceive that change was an indefinite postponement of improvement. But reason goes for nothing with a multitude in want. They are hurried along by the same blind impulse of despair which leads the suicide to take his dreadful leap in the dark in the hope that change of any kind may be the better for him. To these add the natural and inevitable accumulation of private and class and clique discontents and jealousies and disaffections against the party in power, which has been fermenting during its continued ascendancy of fifteen years, and

**ELECTION AT HOME.**  
**Old Crow Wing County Democratic—In a Lull.**  
Election passed off here on Tuesday in a very quiet manner. There was no brawling, no drunkenness, and very little controversy. On national affairs in particular, the contest was an earnest, sober, honest expression of the public views, and probably a fair representation of the political complexion of the county as we have ever had. With perhaps a few exceptions, every man voted according to the dictates of his own conscience, and, we believe, was honest in his convictions.  
Those who voted for Gov. Tilden actually believed him to be the champion of reform he is claimed by the Democratic party to be, while the supporters of President Hayes were convinced that the salvation of the country depended upon his election. The result is very nearly what we expected, and must convince those who predicted so strongly a Democratic majority in the county, that they are, for once in their lives at least, guilty of wide shooting.

Aitkin, Nov. 9.—Peter Hardy was arrested here today for seducing Nellie Pamerie, his wife's sister, eleven years old. He had a preliminary examination before Justice Williams, who ordered him bound over to the next term of the District Court in two thousand dollar bonds. Sheriff Tibbets started to leave the court with the prisoner, when he, the prisoner, was seized by a mob of twenty or thirty persons, and with a rope around his neck verily dragged down the railroad track about twenty rods beyond the depot. Here his head was shaved, and a heavy coat of tar and feathers applied, and the mob, amid the ringing of bells, beating of drums and savage yells marched him back along the track. He escaped from them opposite the Whipple House, and is still at large. It is said that he partially admitted his guilt to the mob, but pleaded that the girl was as much to blame as he was. The mob gave him thirty minutes in which to leave the town. The case is a most disgraceful one, and while mob law is to be condemned, the treatment is too good for the guilty scamp.
