NOTICE. U. S. INTERNAL REVENUE SPECIAL TAXES, May 1, 1877, to April 30, 1878.

Troops to be Withdrawn from the South Carolina State House.

A Washington associated-press telegram of April 22 says: At the cabinet meeting this morning the Secretary of War was directed to prepare an order for the removal of the troops from the State House in Columbia, S. C.

It will be several days before it leaves here. There are no lives lost so far as heard from.

A Proposition of South Carolina Republicans. Gov. Chamberlain and Senators Patterson and Oates have prepared to the President a commission of five persons to be appointed to investigate the late election and declare who was elected Governor and Lieut. Governor, and also who were elected members of the Legislature.

Harper's Weekly publishes a detailed account of Tweed's escape from prison in Dec. 1873. He secured outside aid through one of the prisoners in the jail and passed the winter in New Jersey and on Staten Island.

Murderer Convicted at Manakoa. A dastardly murder was committed in Medo, Blue Earth county, Minnesota, some two years ago, Mrs. Jane Gilbert, a widow lady being the victim.

American Officers Abroad. There is a great scandal in Shanghai, China, caused by public charges made by the United States Consul-General against George D. Seward, his predecessor in office.

The Mystery Explained. A. Oakey Hall, the missing ex-Mayor of New York has arrived in Liverpool. He sailed from Boston on the 17th in the steamship Victoria.

Supposed Loss of a Fishing Fleet. Nine vessels of the Long Island fishing fleet, which left for the banks last November, are now so long overdue that it is believed they were lost in the recent gales.

Louisiana and South Carolina. Letter from the President showing his Policy—Troops Withdrawn from the South Carolina State House.

To Hon. Charles B. Lawrence, J. A. Hawley, John M. Harlan, John O. Brown and Wayne Mac Veigh, Commissioners—General. I am instructed by the President to lay before you some observations upon the occasion and objects which have led him to invite you, as members of the commission about to visit the State of Louisiana, to undertake the public service.

Under the provisions of the act of Congress, approved July 13, 1870, the President is authorized to employ such persons as he may think proper to examine into the condition of the State of Louisiana, and to report to him the result of such examination.
