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Editor Wadena Tribune: DEAR SIR:—I see by your issue of May 26th, that the question of bonding Otter Tail county to the amount of \$150,000 to aid in the construction of the Fergus Falls narrow gauge railroad will again be submitted to a vote on June 12th, 1877.

Now, looking at the rapid settlement and development of the eastern portion of Otter Tail county, and the rapidly increasing influence of this section, it becomes the duty of the residents therein to look sharply after their own interests in this as in every other projected movement.

What I and others object to in this proposition, are the conditions under which the said bonds are to be delivered to the railroad company. I do not know whether it would be legal to deliver any bonds to the company until the road was finished and in working order so far as it runs through the county, so bonding itself.

But leaving that question for the lawyers, let us look at the proposed conditions for the delivery of the bonds, and we find that by building and equipping 20 miles of road, from Pelican Rapids to Fergus Falls, the company are entitled to receive \$70,000 in bonds, thus: \$10,000 for the first 10 miles graded and ties laid, \$20,000 for the second 10 miles so graded, \$30,000 for the first 10 miles completed and cars running, \$20,000 for the second 10 miles completed and cars running, making a total of \$70,000.

Thus, Mr. Editor, you see that nearly one-half of the amount is to be delivered on the completion of only about one-third of the road. Here is where the mystery to us comes in: Why was this evidently one-sided arrangement made? I dare not guess.

Now suppose, after building the 20 miles of road from Pelican Rapids to Fergus Falls, and receiving the bonds, the company should fail, accidentally or otherwise, to build the other portion, and instead of so doing, should get an act passed empowering them to build north, say to Frazee City or to Lake Park, a distance perhaps of 22 or 23 miles; and how easily this could be done, you, Mr. Editor, know (and who knows but that the towns on the route might be induced to aid by bonding themselves?) In such a case what would be the consequence? The company would of course forfeit the unpaid portion of the bonds, and we in this part of the county would have the satisfaction of paying our quota of the bonds and interest without the annoyance of having a railroad in operation to kill our stock.

It may be said that provision is made for summing and carrying on the work at both ends at the same time, but let me remark, it does not say that the same proportion of work shall be carried on at both ends at the same time; thus they might have one hundred men at one end, and one at the other end, and still be fulfilling the conditions imposed, and here is where the ambiguity comes in.

Now I content that in transactions of this character, the provisions ought to be made as clear as the English language can make them, and then, and not until then, will the promoters of this scheme have the full confidence and vote of the people. Then let the parties who are able, either alone or else so change them that the question may come before the people on a fair and square issue, clear and above board, as such questions ought to be. Thus if for one would short success to the Northern R. R. and its promoters, and vote as well as about Trusting an explanation may be given, or a change made, I am, Yours respectfully, W. S. H. Civil Service Reform. EXECUTIVE MESSAGES, May 20. Mr. ...

Crash-News Surrounders. The Indian chief Crazy-Horse, and his band of 800 warriors formally surrendered to Gen. Crook, at Camp Robinson, on the 25th.

Another Battle with Indians. Gen. Miles, with Companies F, H, I and G, of the 2d Cavalry, and 35 mounted men of the 5th Infantry, attacked an Indian village on Little Muddy Creek, ninety miles from the mouth of the Grand River, on the 17th.

Organizing a New Party. According to previous arrangement a secret meeting was held in Washington on the 24th for the purpose of organizing a national party.

Ex-President Grant in England. Ex-President Grant arrived at Liverpool on the steamer Indiana, on the 28th.

Extensive Label Business. Criminal indictments for libel have been found by the grand jury of El Dorado county, California, against the San Francisco Chronicle on the complaint of Senator Sargent.

Gov. Stone of Mississippi, in relation to the Kemper county massacre, states that he has done all in his power to bring the guilty ones to trial by requesting Judge Hamon, the Circuit Judge, to call an extra session of the court for that purpose.

In the United States court at Hartford, Conn., Judge Shipman pronounced sentence on James L. Chapman, and John C. Tracy, President of the Farmers and Mechanics' National Bank, who had pleaded guilty to deceiving the Comptroller of the Currency, and to perjury and embezzlement.

An Appointment Declined. On Monday last Secretary Sherman tendered the appointment of Solicitor of the Treasury to ex-Gov. Chamberlain at the instance of the President, who also urged its acceptance.

It is announced from Liverpool that Gen. Grant, United States consul there, is absent on leave, and that Gen. Baden, Consul General at London, is going to Liverpool to receive ex-President Grant.

Fletcher Harper Dead. Fletcher Harper, the last of the four brothers comprising the original firm of Harper Brothers is dead, at the age of 72. The sons of the brothers will continue the business as usual.

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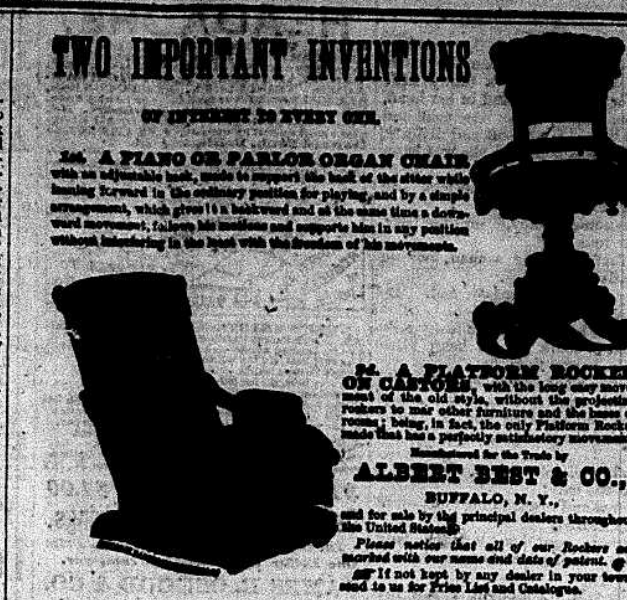
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
