One Hundred Persons Lost at Sea.

Information of a fearful disaster and loss of life in the English Channel was received on the 13th. The British ship Avalanche, Captain Williams, from London, September 4th, for New Zealand, came in collision with the British ship Forest, Captain Lockhart, from London for New York, off Portland, and both vessels foundered. Ninety-nine persons were drowned. The Forest's crew numbered 81, Captain Lockhart, the chief mate and seven others are saved. The Forest struck the Avalanche between the main and mizzen masts, nearly cutting her in two. The latter sank immediately. The Forest, though utterly wrecked, kept afloat an hour or two, three boats were launched from her, only one of which has yet been saved. It contained twelve persons mentioned as saved. One boat washed ashore and several ladies. The other boat, it is feared, is lost. The Avalanche had 63 passengers—29 sailors, 12 second class and 23 first class, mostly colonists. The disaster occurred at half-past 9 last night, and seven miles off Portland. From latest information received up to the 13th, it appears that over 100 persons lost their lives.

A Serious Form of Cattle Plague.

Cattle plague, thought to be a form of the Texas fever, has broken out among the cattle in the country surrounding Cleveland, O. Texas cattle this year are covered with ticks of various kinds, the bite of which is poisonous to the blood. Many cattlemen daily. Several cases of children having been poisoned by drinking of infected milk have already come to the notice of the city physicians. Beef is affected by the disease, it is said to be very infectious, and a veterinary surgeon who has treated about 40 cases says the symptoms with which cows are stricken, consist of anorexia, loss of milk, and a bloody passage of urine and in a few hours death. He recommends as a disinfectant for the ticks and an antidote for the poison.

The French Financial Policy.

The following statement emanates from high financial authority in Washington. "Constant allusion is being made to the policy of France in regard to resumption; being different from that adopted here, when the truth is that the country is acting upon the very policy that the United States is pursuing; but France is reducing the circulation much more rapidly than the United States. The Bank of France has withdrawn 100 millions of francs during the last twelve months, to the amount of at least twelve millions pounds sterling, or sixty million dollars, and has accumulated cash about the same ratio, and is now practically at specie payments, and would no doubt formally resume but for the unsettled condition of the silver question which is far more disturbed than here.

Efforts to Reopen Cotton Claims.

Efforts have been made recently on the part of claim agents to get the treasury department to re-open a number of their cotton claims. Thus a secretary Sherman and assistant secretary French have decided against all these applications and refused to refer the cases to solicitor Raynor for an opinion which the persons were very desirous should be done.

The Great Forgery.

It is stated the detectives have traced the \$64,000 check on the Union Trust company of New York and have fastened the guilt upon two clerks, one in the Union Trust company and one in the New York life insurance company. On the 8th, the counsel for Nelson A. Geener, indicted for complicity in the forgery, presented a petition for habeas corpus, returnable forthwith.

Hayward Hayes at Marietta.

President Hayes and family, consisting of his wife and two sons, and accompanied by Postmaster General Key and attorney General Devens attended the reunion of the soldiers at Marietta Ohio on the 7th, and was enthusiastically received by the large crowd present. The President and Generals Key and Devens all made speeches which elicited loud applause.

Checking Chinese Immigration.

Tung Pok, a prominent Chinese merchant, left San Francisco for Hong Kong on the City of Peking on the 12th. He goes to carry the request made by Colonel Bee and endorsed by the Chinese companies, to visit the districts from which Chinese people migrate for California, for the purpose of checking or limiting any further migration.

A Little Better Prospect.

Further investigations into the affairs of the State savings bank of Chicago, has resulted in the discovery of a number of new notes which will figure as available assets, and will probably bring the assets to a million dollar or over, and render an eventual payment of thirty to forty cents on the dollar possible.

The New Mexican President.

John Taylor, president of the United States, is acting President of the Mexican Republic until a new President is elected. Taylor was shot at Nauvoo at the time Joe Smith was shot, and is a most bitter and bigoted religious fanatic.

Heavy Storm on the Coast.

A heavy rain storm began at Atlantic City on the night of the 7th, and continued all day. The tide was higher than ever before, doing great damage to property. The excursion house was carried out to sea. Railroads were covered with two or three feet of water, extinguishing fires in locomotives.

Determined to Stay.

News from Fort Walsh of August 14th says Billington Bill is encamped at a point near Moose Butte, 130 miles from Fort Walsh and from Wood Mountain. He has no intention of going on the war path. He is determined to remain under British protection.

The Manchester, England, Examiner publishes the following dispatch, announcing the capture of Plevna by the Russians; "Plevna, Sunday night, Sept. 13. The morning attack on all sides of Plevna commenced and was continued throughout the day. By 6 o'clock in the evening the town of Plevna was in the hands of the Russians, and the Turks were in full retreat in great disorder. Losses are enormous, but details not yet received."

The unfortunate sufferer, who happened to be the village tailor, knew that the farmer was a miser and he had no doubt he had been deceived. He brought an action for \$250 damages in the Malmesbury county court in due course. According to the plaintiff's evidence, his beard was eighteen inches long when he laid down after having some ale. The next thing he remembered was his face being scratched by the paper, and he was next hearing a long tirade in a high, nasal, nasal tone, in which the plaintiff was offering an apology for what had been done. His lips were burned severely, his face was blistered and his beard, eyebrows and eyelashes were burned to the skin, and one eye and one ear were scorched. The magistrate awarded him £250 and costs.
