Two years ago a corn speculator at (Charles) Iowa, refused sixty cents a bushel for 20,000 bushels of corn he had raised for thirty cents. It is now vainly trying to get out on a bushel for a net profit of one cent.

The State Board of Agriculture, which met at Columbus, Ohio, 25th week, decided to accept the bonds of \$100,000 voted by the citizens of Columbus, Ohio, State Fair at the place for the ensuing two years.

A correspondent, writing from Gulf Coast, Texas, reports that the prevalence of the oriole among miscellaneous birds has been the cause of a great deal of damage to the crops, and that it is with the exception of the oriole that the pest is said to be the most voracious.
