The official result in Maine is as follows: Davis (Rep.), 62,018; Smith (Greenback), 21,181; Republican (Dem.), 21,181; Republican plurality over Greenback ticket, 20,922; Republican plurality over Democratic ticket, 46,831. (11—12, as usual.)

Another very important change has just been made in the classification of mail papers, by which printed promissory notes, insurance policies, commercial papers such as drafts, checks, deeds, bonds, etc.—filled out and ready for signature, but not signed or executed—and partly printed bills filled out in writing but not receipted, are classed as third class matter, and may be sent for one cent for two ounces or fraction, which must be fully prepaid and placed in unsealed coverings.

P. Barrow, of Stearns; Secretary of State—P. M. Blomquist, of Ramsey; Treasurer—L. C. Cowley, of Otsego; Attorney General—P. M. Blomquist, of Ramsey; Railroad Commissioner—Wm. Colville, of Goodhue; Outside of the finalized "head," Edmund Rice, of St. Paul—not a nominee on the ticket is known outside his own backlist, and the victory of the Republican party in Minnesota by a big margin is assured.
